

WHITE MAN'S LAW MAY INVADE ARCTIC

Eleven Eskimos To Be Tried For
Murder; Trial First of Kind
In Natives' Own Country

EDMONTON, Alta., July 2.—Headed by Judge Lucien Dubuc, a judicial party has left Edmonton for Herschel Island, in the Arctic, where eleven Eskimos will be tried on charges of murder. This is the first occasion on which Eskimos have been tried for murder in their own country; all previous trials have been carried on "outside," it is said.

Those to be held at Herschel Island represent tribes from all over the western Arctic. Their capture and subsequent handing over to the police at Herschel by the Royal Canadian mounted police was commended.

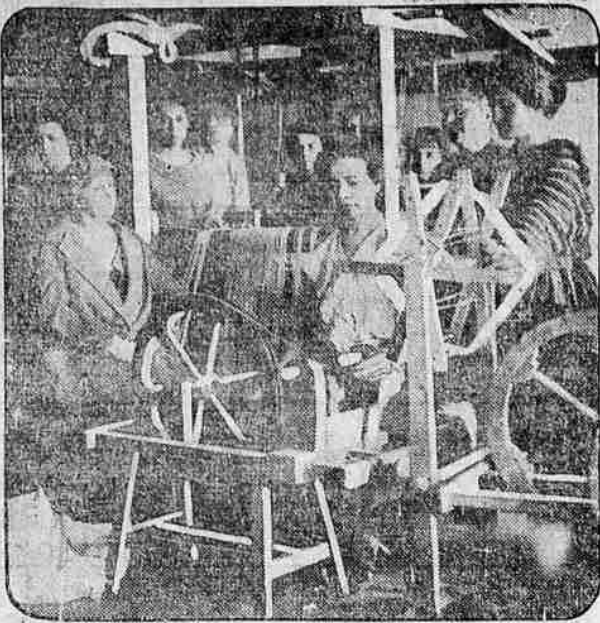
A number of the Eskimos were brought in by dog teams for 1,000 miles or more along the bleak shores of the Arctic. One constable charged with the delivery of a prisoner had no companion but the prisoner himself. Every night one helped the other to build snow igloos and make camp. Despite almost insurmountable obstacles, the "mountie" won through and delivered his prisoner.

COURT RAIMENT WAS EXPENSIVE LUXURY

Americans Who Shared Recent
Court Found Privilege of Meet-
ing Sovereigns Costly

LONDON, June 2.—American who were fortunate enough to share in the recent court of King George and Queen Mary found the privilege of meeting the British sovereigns a rather expensive one.

To conform to accepted etiquette on such occasions it was necessary for the men to wear silk velvet suits with knee breeches, knee and shoe buckles, and silk stockings. The whole costing them something like \$200.

The women's raiment, consisting of court gown with long train, feathers and veil, fan, gloves, slippers and silk stockings, represented an outlay of \$300 or more. These clothes were discarded immediately after the court function because they possess no utilitarian value.

There are certain imperative regulations which must be observed by women in court dress. Skirts must not be less than three inches from the ground, and trains must measure no more than 18 inches

from the heels of the wearer when standing. The veil must not be more than 45 inches long. Bouquets and fans are optional, but many women choose flowers.

Poincaré has said that he is tired of this support, and his friends would not be surprised if, on an early occasion, he forced the opposition to take power whether it wants to or not by resigning.

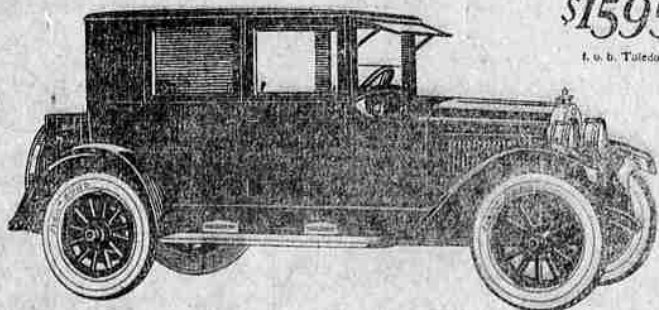
