SITE OF MARBLE TOURNAMENT

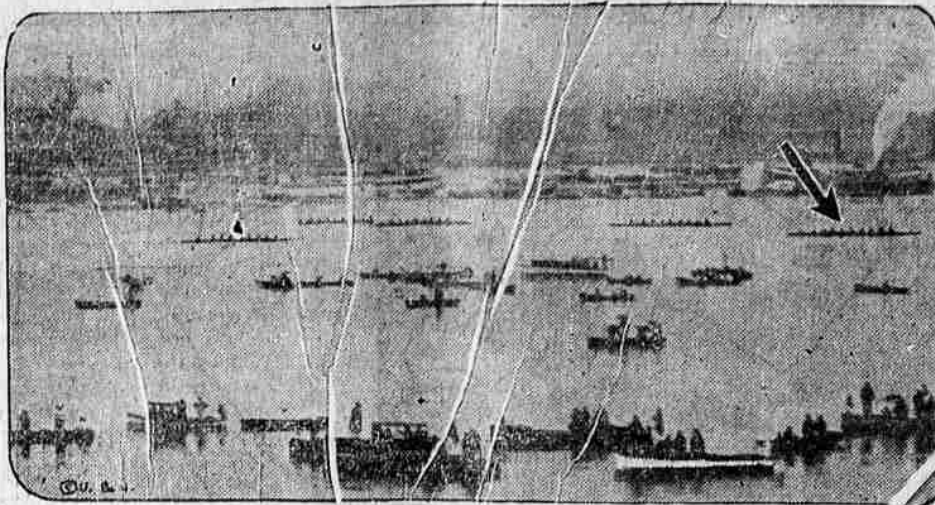


'FREAK' PLAYS TO BE BARRED

TURKS TO CHANGE NAME OF ANCIENT SHRINE OF GREEKS

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 6.—In order to remove all vestiges of Greek domination of Constantinople, the Turks intend changing the name of the historic mosque of St. Sophia to Mohammed Mosque, that is, the Mosque of Mahomet.

Founded by the builder of Constantinople itself, Constantine the Great, who dedicated it to "eternal wisdom," St. Sophia mosque is one of the most famous and religious buildings in the world. For more than a thousand years it was one of Christianity's most cherished shrines. It was built in the year 326. It was destroyed by fire in 404, restored, and again destroyed. Under Theodosius it was rebuilt into a magnificent church in 415, and 150 years later was further embellished by Justinian. Twenty years later the main dome fell in, and again it was restored to eclipse its former grandeur.

It is said 100 architects were employed, each of whom had a staff of 100 artisans. The altar

was of gems set in gold and silver; the doors were of ivory, amber and cedar, the outer one being silver plated. After the capture of Constantinople by the Turks in 1453, the church was converted into a mosque.

By the Turks St. Sophia mosque is held in a veneration second only to that which surrounds the famous Kaaba, or sacred house, at Mecca. The Greeks regard it with equal sacredness, and they have never given up their dream that a king of the name of Constantine would one day retake Constantinople for Greece and with it St. Sophia. They hoped the late King Constantine would fulfill that role, but political misfortune and death intervened.

DREAM OF "COLD LIGHT" ACHIEVED BY LABORATORIES

CHICAGO, July 6.—Removing 90 per cent of the heat from light—a long step toward the scientist's dream of "cold light" has been achieved by a device recently tested and approved by the Underwriters Laboratories, Inc., here for the Society of Visual Education.

The device is an actinic ray filter for motion picture projectors, and by its use it is possible to stop a highly inflammable film and project "still" pictures without setting fire to the film.

The filter utilizes an old principle that certain materials will break down the heat rays while allowing light rays to pass through. A thin film of gold is the substance used.

The filter consists of two small glass discs, an inch and a half in diameter, coated on one side with a spray of pure gold, and then cemented together, with the coated sides adjoining.

In use, the projector is so arranged that the disc is held above the projection aperture as long as the camera is running and the film moving. Whenever the motor is stopped, or even slows up to a dangerous degree, the disc is automatically released and drops into place between the light and the film. The light shining through the gold has a slight

greenish cast, but not enough to interfere with the projection of the still pictures.

At close examination the disc appears to be opaque and looks like a mirror with a gold instead of a silver back. It will reflect objects as readily as an ordinary mirror. When held to the light, however, the thin gold film appears transparent.

Tests at the laboratory of the Underwriters showed the disc was 90 per cent efficient, only one-tenth of the heat applied on one side being recorded on the other, and that a strip of nitro-cellulose film could be left motionless in the camera indefinitely without danger of fire so long as the filter was in place.
