L. A. MAN IN 30 MILE SWIM

LOS ANGELES, July 6.—E. A. Banfield, of the Los Angeles Y. M. C. 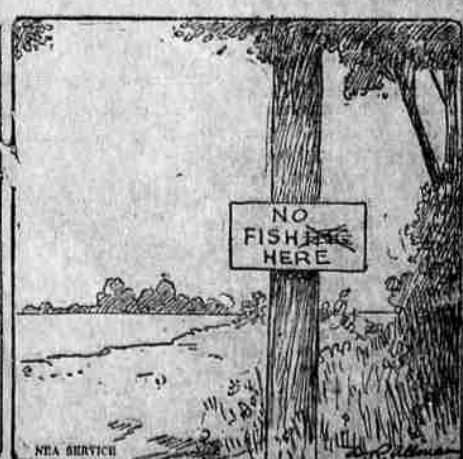
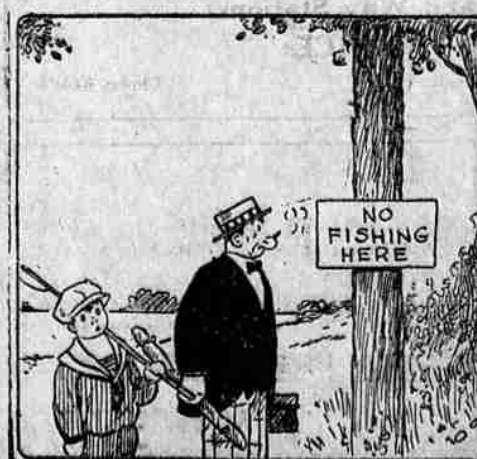
