knowing in advance just what was wanted, no data had been prepared for presentation at this time, and except for figures presented by E. A. Henderson, county agent, on livestock shipments, none was offered.

Devers told the gathering that the commission wanted to know whether the building of the railroads proposed by the commission—from Crane to Odell, Bend to Odell, Lakeview to Odell and from Kirk to Oakridge—would be of benefit to this county, and if the roads were built what would Klamath county have to offer in freight tonnage. No expressions were heard on these questions.

Modoc Northern Not Included

H. D. Mortenson asked whether the commission complaint included the Modoc Northern, and urged its construction. Corey replied that since the Modoc Northern is in California, beyond Oregon jurisdiction, it had not been included in the complaint, but he thought that if the other roads were constructed the Modoc line would naturally follow. He said that he and his aides were there to assist in the preparation of the information they wanted. Asked whether the I. C. C. under the Esch-Cummings act had ever forced the building of railroads, Corey replied in the negative, saying that the law had been operative but a short time.

Could Force Privilege

Corey said that if the roads named in the complaint were forced by the I. C. C. to build, any one of them could by court action require common user privileges on the Natron cut-off because it is a mountain gateway. The commission in its complaint is asking for common user privileges on the Natron cut-off. The Southern Pacific has said that it could not afford to build the line under common user agreement, and the chamber of commerce here for that reason went on record as opposing such privileges.

From here the public service commission will go to La Pine tomorrow morning, then to Summer Lake, Paisley, Lakeview and Burns, reaching Bend for a hearing July 18.

Special State Prohibition Agent Turns in His Star

John Farnell is no longer a special state prohibition agent. Upon his return from Meacham, where he went to attend the Oregon trail celebration which was witnessed by President Harding, Farnell announced that he had "turned in his star."

A petition asking the revocation of Farnell's commission was recently sent to the governor from here. The petition alleged that Farnell was incompetent to handle the work in connection with the office of special state agent. Farnell did not admit that his resignation had been requested.

BOY SAVED FROM DROWNING WILLS WOMAN \$250,000

Fortune Comes To Mrs. Clara May Miller For Heroic Act Of 25 Years Ago

LOS ANGELES, July 11.—Mrs. Clara May Miller, saleswoman for an oil syndicate has announced receipt of a letter from a Boston law firm telling her she had been left \$250,000 in the will of Theodore Tibbets, leather manufacturer of Lynn, Mass., whom she saved from drowning when he was a small boy.

About 25 years ago, Mrs. Miller said she was a member of a party crossing the bay of Fundy on a steamship. Tibbets, then a youngster, climbed to the rail and fell overboard. Mrs. Miller, then Miss Clara Beckwith, although fully dressed, immediately jumped in and rescued the boy.

Tibbets' father gave her \$1,000 to buy clothes to replace those ruined and the Canadian authorities, she states gave her a medal for heroism.

COLLEGE OF SURGEONS TO HOLD MEETING IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, July 11.—Hospital standardization, scientific research, application of recently developed formulas in the control of disease, surgical and medical clinics and a series of technical discussions in the advancement of science, are among the features of the program of the American College of Surgeons, which will hold its annual meeting here October 22-26.

The surgical and clinical program will be carried out in 40 Chicago hospitals, medical schools and laboratories, according to announcement by A. D. Ballou, general manager of the congress. Membership in the college extends to every state in the union, Alaska, the Philippines, every province in Canada, Central and South America, England and the continent, China and other countries, Ballou said, all of which countries are expected to be represented by delegates.

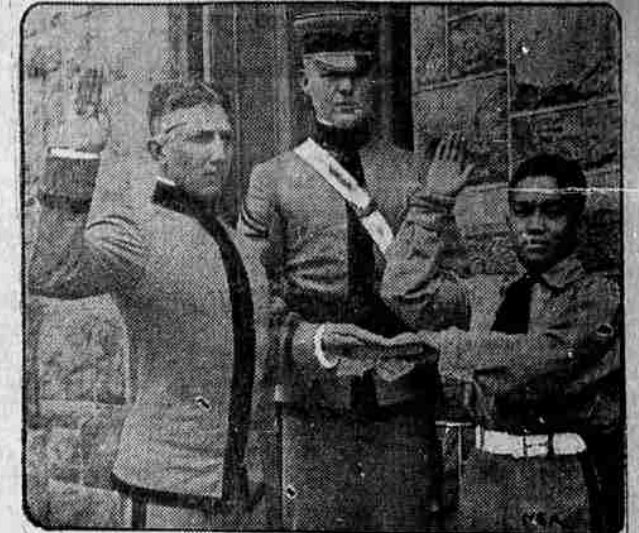

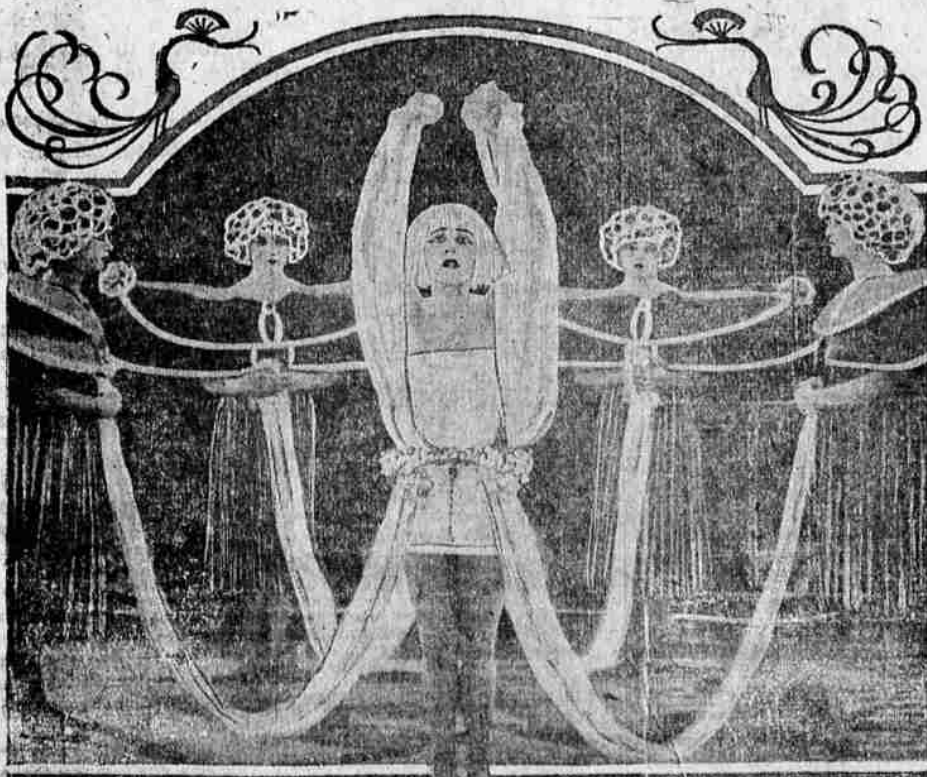
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
