OBNOXIOUS YOUNG MAN EJECTED FROM CRATER LAKE PARK

Edward Chandler Charged With Raising Rumps At Lodge Made To Leave Reservation Afoot

CRATER LAKE, July 13.—Edward Chandler, a young man claiming Oregon as his residence, made himself obnoxious to the authorities at Crater lake national park by raising a disturbance at the lodge, fighting, breaking down a door and creating a general rumpus. Near midnight he was taken into custody by Chief Ranger Ord and Ranger Taylor and taken before Superintendent Thomson, who after a hearing had him escorted to the western entrance of the park. When ejected from the park he was started afoot for Union creek, 11 miles distant, and further points west. There are but a half dozen "don'ts" in effect in national parks, the entire effort of the national park service being to impress upon all visitors that the parks belong

to them with only such restrictions necessary to preserve the reservation intact, protect wild life and to assure the absolute safety of tourists. An ample ranger force, however, is on hand to see that these few regulations are observed uniformly without fear of favor—as Chandler will testify.

A considerable crew of men are now busy digging the snow out from the deep drifts along the Watchman. Twenty three miles of the rim road are already open for travel. The Klamath road has already been graded and work began Tuesday morning on the stretch from government camp to the Medford entrance. Recent rainfalls have

served to put down the dust. G. A. Harris, of San Francisco, was taken before Commissioner of Justice Steel and found guilty of reckless driving. Sworn testimony brought out the fact that he had driven twice the legal speed within the park and had forced a truck off the road. He was fined \$25.
