BLACK CURRANT BUSHES BANNED

Rigid Quarantine Against Importation Into Idaho Will Be Inaugurated By Commissioner

BOISE, Idaho, July 13.—A rigid quarantine against the importation into Idaho of black currant bushes will be inaugurated soon by State Commissioner of Agriculture Mark Means, it is announced, upon the advice of a special committee for the eradication of the white pine blister rust.

The quarantine also will apply to other currants and gooseberry plants. The committee, in its report, asserted that if the rust became firmly established in Idaho it would be necessary to destroy currant and gooseberry bushes over a wide area. The blister rust recently was discovered near Moscow, Idaho.

The state agricultural authorities have been authorized, through the legislature, to destroy approximately 1,500 black currant bushes in northern Idaho, and pay their owners for them, to prevent the spreading of the blister rust to the nineteen billions of feet of white pine standing in that section of the state. The white pine in Idaho has a stumpage value of \$190,000,000.

PUNCTUALITY NOW MARKS TRAIN SERVICE IN ITALY

ROME, July 13.—The spirit of discipline which the Mussolini government brought in with it is no more concretely illustrated than on the railroads and in the telegraph service of Italy. Italian trains are now run on time—one can even set one's watch by them—and the time of transmission on internal and foreign telegrams has been reduced to one-fourth of what it was before the advent of Italy's young dictator to power.

The Italian crack trains on the main trunk lines cover their distances with minute precision and according to schedule. The Rome-Milan expresses leave and arrive on the second. The Rome-Naples trains are equally on schedule, while the service between Genoa and Trieste, through Milan and Venice, also records the same punctuality.

Special policemen do service on all the lines, and are present on trains to prevent theft or disorder.

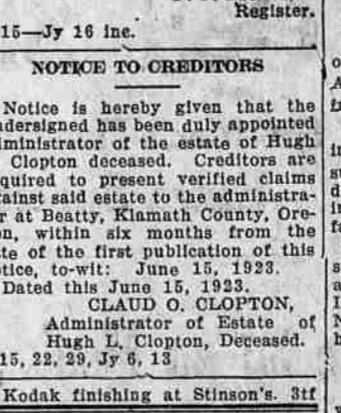
