Mr. and Mrs. M. Klippert of Oakland, who have been visiting in Klamath Falls, left yesterday for Medford by way of Crater lake.

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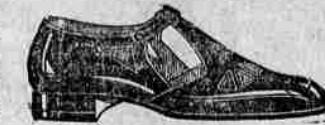
