"Well," said the clerk considering, "there's Pike Casey up in that third house on the left—he died last night."

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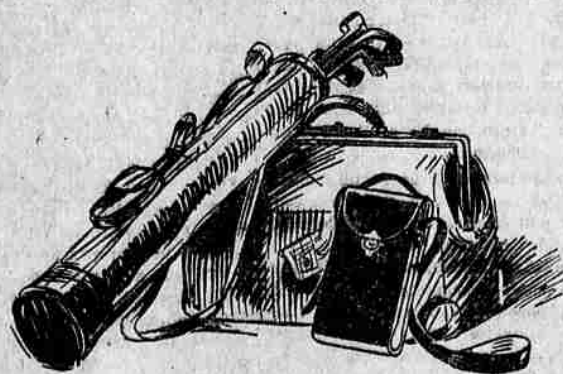
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WHERE PARTICULAR PEOPLE
