## SALVAGE CAR FOUR DAYS UNDER WATER

SPOKANE, Wash., July 21.—A seven passenger automobile, wrecked and spilled into the Spokane river near here in a road accident, was recently salvaged after lying for four days under 20 feet of water.

The car was little damaged, considering its watery burial. Two spare tires, in addition to the four on the wheels, were fully inflated. Upon removal of the spark plugs, the air still compressed in the cylinders shot water several inches high. As a result of rolling about on the river bottom, it was found that the car had suffered breakage of the fenders, lights, top, and one spring, but the body finish was apparently in almost perfect condition.

## JAPAN IMPORTS SHOW BIG GAIN

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 21.—The amount of goods sold to Japan for the eleven months ending May, 1923, dropped \$36,180,555 compared with the corresponding months of the previous year, while goods imported from Japan for the same period increased \$76,708,039, compared with 1922, according to statistics compiled by the department of commerce here.

Goods sold to China for the same eleven-month period slumped \$1,775,595, while shipments of goods to China through western ports increased \$55,796,338, the commerce department figures show.

Thus, it is shown, that while five Pacific countries sold American merchants \$180,512,848 more goods for the eleven months ended May, 1923, compared with 1922, they bought \$1,718,548 less goods than in 1922.
