When the Colorado club boy's pig grows into a fat hog he finds a good market at the Western National Live Stock Show. Beginning with 1921, the exhibiting and sale of fat hogs fed by club boys following the methods advocated by extension workers and shipped cooperatively in carload lots, has been one of the features of this show. Last year four carloads were exhibited by these young stockmen, according to reports to the United States Department of Agriculture, and later auctioned off. Two carloads of straight Duroc-Jerseys, one car of Poland-Chinas, and one car of mixed Poland-Chinas and Durocs were included. The carload receiving first prize sold for the highest price paid for any carload in the entire show and the other three brought top prices.

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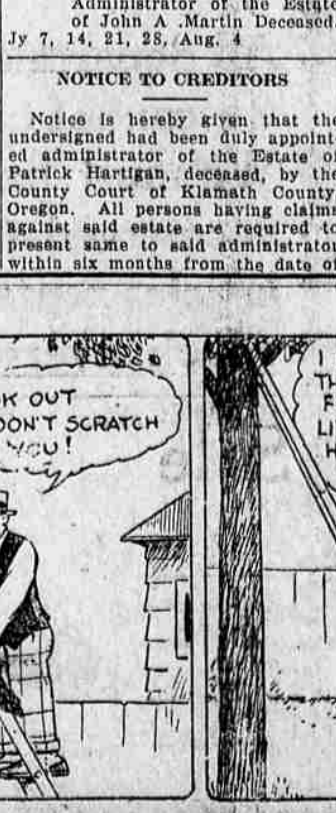

HOPÍ BUILDINGS ARE TRACED BACK TO YEAR OF 1620

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., July 21.—Scientists have determined that the Hopi Indian buildings of many of the villages of the tribe northeast of Flagstaff date back to about 1620 when the Hopis revolted against the Spanish priests and tore down missions built by the Spaniards, using many timbers from the missions in constructing their own houses.

A party including Dr. A. E. Douglas of the University of Arizona and Dr. J. A. Jeancon of the Colorado state museum returned recently from the Hopi pueblo villages, where they made a study of the wooden beams in the ancient structures.

Professor Douglas has specialized in the study of rings in Arizona trees with the result that he has been able to determine the age of timbers.

The scientists' principal difficulty lay in securing the permission of the Indians to make borings in the beams which are held sacred by the Hopis.

When this permission was finally obtained a number of one-inch borings were made and the examination indicated that the beams had been cut about the year 1620 when tradition says the Spanish built their missions in northeastern Arizona. Some 60 years later came the Hopi revolt and the missions were torn down.

Many of the beams in the Indian dwellings are decorated with rich carvings which Dr. Douglas says are the work of the Spaniards.

IMPROVED COTTON INCREASES

The proportion of cotton of improved varieties grown in North Carolina has increased 50 per cent within the past eight years, according to reports to the United States Department of Agriculture. Community crop improvement work with cotton was begun in the State by agricultural experiment station and extension workers eight years ago. The plan followed has been to establish community test farms throughout the State to demonstrate the best variety of cotton to grow in the locality and the value of the use of selected seed. Efforts are made to secure the growing of this variety alone in the community. When the work was begun, it was estimated that 90 per cent of North Carolina cotton was produced from seed of low yield and mixed, small boll varieties.
