MEXICALI FIRE LOSS ADJUSTED

MEXICALI, Lower California, July 23.—Insurance adjustments have advanced sufficiently to allow entry to ruins of several places in the zone of the recent big fire here, in which it is estimated that the loss was more than \$3,000,000. An unknown number of lives were lost. Remains of two Chinese captives have been recovered from sub cellars entered so far.

Water remaining in the lower cellars will probably prevent search for several weeks longer. Several safes in which groups of Chinese hoarded their funds in cellars have been recovered and their contents, aggregating more than \$33,000, found intact.

Insurance adjusters handling the fire losses have encountered unusual difficulty in conducting their work because of the fact that the books of the insured concerns were all kept in Chinese characters, representing stocks to the value of nearly \$2,000,000. Interpreters have been necessary and the work of the adjusters unnecessarily slow.

FILM FANS OF EUROPE DEMAND GIRLS WITH GRACEFUL HANDS, FEET

American Pictures Set New Standards in Studios of Foreign Countries

BERLIN, July 23.—Young women with graceful hands and feet are now being sought by European film directors in their efforts to compete with American films. American pictures long ago made it difficult for the film studios of central Europe to market pictures abroad, or even at home, if the heroines were not young and beautiful.

The practice of featuring famous actresses regardless of their looks has gone into the discard. For a long time the German and Swedish moving picture producers clung tenaciously to the theory that histrionic art was the chief feature of a film, but today they are looking for youth and beauty of figure, as well as beauty of face. Europe's tired business man wants to see girl shows, and he wants youth in his musical comedies and movies alike. As a result German movie actresses are all dieting.

There has been also a marked change in the types of footwear popular on the German stage. Long, slender shoes on American and English models are making their appearance. The short-vamped shoe, which central Europe used to have made the foot look small has been abandoned.

Shoe shops everywhere are advertising real American styles, and it is no longer possible to identify

American men and women immediately by their shoes.

Russian women have beautiful hands and feet, and have found great favor with the film photographers who are constantly on the lookout for grace, even in the humblest members of their mobs.
