

DEPUTY'S LECTURE FAILED TO IMPRESS WOMAN IN PRISON

"Have You Got a Cigarette?" Was
Only Response To Efforts
To Reform Her

SPOKANE, Wash., July 27.—An hour's lecture by Deputy Prosecutor Edward Connelly to Elizabeth Ryan, now sentenced to serve from six months to 15 years in the state penitentiary for conviction on a charge of obtaining merchandise under false pretenses, seems to have "gone in one ear and out the other."

"Have you got a cigarette?" was her only response to the efforts to "reform" her.

The woman was convicted of representing herself as her sister and thus obtaining money at a local store. Officers stated she had been in trouble twice before on similar charges.

DAUGHERTY TO CONFER ON S. P. C. P. SITUATION

names of individuals or organizations against whom court action might be taken in the protracted San Francisco conflict. Daugherty let it be known that the facts in the case had been before department of justice officials for some months and the legal proceedings to protect the right of building workers to organize were in view.

To Discuss Plans

Daugherty, on his arrival in San Francisco, will confer with his assistants who have been handling the case, he said.

Recalling that he once had advised certain train association representatives and civic body delegates from San Francisco that "a boycott against labor is as indefensible as a boycott against industry," the department of justice chief said that he now stood ready to test that position in legal proceedings.

Situation Bad

A bad industrial situation had developed in San Francisco because of the long conflict between the building workers and the unnamed forces "which seemed bent upon

their destruction," Daugherty said. The building industry had been crippled for a long period, housing needs remained unfilled and worst of all, an ugly tempo, developed by the conflict was extending beyond the bounds of the industry itself into other fields. The menace embodied in this latter factor constituted in itself, in the view of department officials, sufficient ground for vigorous action.

"The right of the workers to organize into trade unions for lawful purposes is as fundamental in America as the right to vote—and as well supported in law," Daugherty said in outlining his position. "Any attempt to infringe that right is illegal. I shall confer with agents of the department on the coast, and will be prepared to go into court to defend the view I have expressed."

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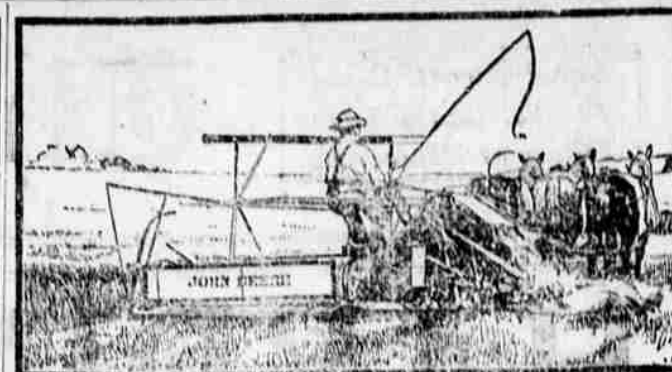

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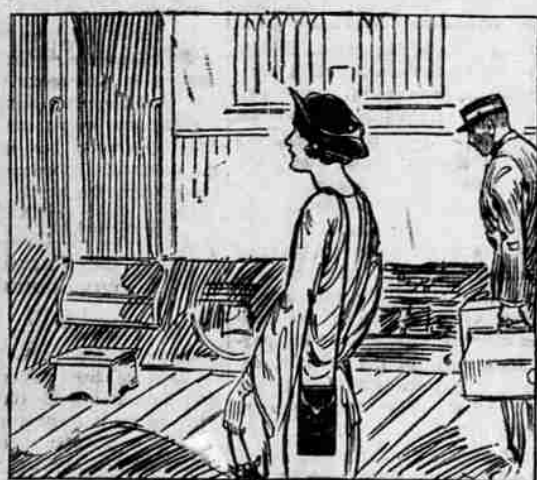
