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DEMONSTRATIONS IN INDIA RESULT IN NUMEROUS ARRESTS

NAGPUR, India, July 30.—Demonstrations held in connection with the display of the Indian national flag continue daily in Nagpur, and have spread to other cities of India. Arrests in Nagpur for flag agitation now total 540. As a rule the prisoners are given brief prison sentences.

At Jabalpur the national flag has been hoisted over the town hall on four separate days, with resulting arrests by the police on each occasion. The initial hoisting of the flag was preceded by a street procession in which about eight

thousand people, including many women, took part. This procession, headed by a drum corps, marched to the town hall singing national songs. Volunteers reached the portico and dome by the aid of ladders and ropes. One of the men then climbed the flag pole and fastened the flag, encouraged by loud cheering from the people below. The crowd which witnessed the scene is estimated at twenty thousand.

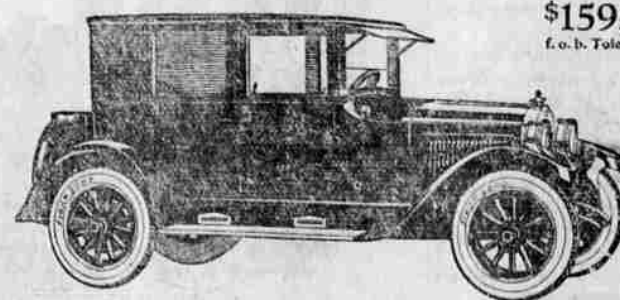
