Decrees Signed

A decree was signed by Judge Leavitt yesterday in the case of William Totten vs. J. H. K. Haynes.

and wife, and the First National bank of Merrill. The decree orders that an agreement contained in an escrow set forth in the complaint be performed by the defendants, and that Haynes accept within 90 days, from the First National bank of Klamath Falls, a soldier's bonus for \$3,000 as a cash payment on the purchase price of the land involved in the suit. It is further decreed that the sum of \$3,000 be impressed for an equitable lien for \$603.55 in favor of the First National bank of Merrill, and that said sum be paid out of the said \$3,000 by the First National bank of Klamath Falls to the Merrill bank, when the latter satisfies mortgage given it February 28, 1923, by Haynes. Upon the refusal of Haynes to accept the soldier's loan as cash payment, less the payment to the Merrill bank, it is adjudged that the balance shall be deposited to the credit of Haynes in the First National bank of Klamath Falls. It is also ordered that plaintiff recover from defendants the cost of the suit.

In the case of D. V. Kuykendall vs. George M. Stowbridge and wife and George M. Wright and wife, a decree was signed yesterday giving the plaintiff judgment for \$6,000, with interest from August, 1921, and costs and disbursements. The following orders were signed by Judge Leavitt yesterday: Order confirming sale in the case of the Union Oil company of California vs. the Pacific Coast Mint company; order confirming sale of real estate in the case of William M.

Buncean vs. John V. Johnson; order of default against the defendants in the case of Lizzie M. Fitch vs. Albert C. Buncean and William A. Buncean and wife. In the case of the state of Oregon against George Dawson, held in jail on a forgery charge, it was ordered that the defendant be released on his own recognizance, and paroled to L. E. Blighman.

A divorce complaint was filed in the circuit court yesterday by Florence vs. Joseph Kessner. Plaintiff alleges cruel and inhuman treatment and asks the custody of four minor children. The couple were married July 13, 1920.

HAWAIIANS SAY ALIEN LAW O. K.

HONOLULU, T. H. Aug. 1.—The territory of Hawaii will not concede that the law adopted by the last legislature to regulate alien language schools is rendered invalid by the recent decision of the United States supreme court, declaring unconstitutional the alien language schools of twenty states, according to territorial Attorney General John Mathewman.

The territory will continue to defend its statute in the pending legislation brought by several Japanese language schools on the contention that the law is unconstitutional.
