U. S. HORSES IN GRUELLING RUN

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 1.—The Colorado endurance ride, being held at Colorado Springs July 30 to August 3, inclusive, is open only to horses showing purebred parentage at least in either sire or dam. A. F. Hayes, secretary of the race, announced here. Hayes said:

"The reason for this is apparent. The main purpose of the endurance race is to encourage the breeding of pure-bred stock in order that a recognized standard may be attained. If horses of unknown breeding are allowed to enter, nothing tangible can be learned from their performance beyond the qualities of the individual horse. No lesson can be learned for future guidance in breeding. The work must be kept in line with that of the government bureau of animal husbandry, which is doing much in the same direction."

The endurance ride will call for sixty miles each day for five consecutive days. The conditions are similar to those of a forced march of cavalry in war, Hayes said. The total weight carried is 225 pounds, and the time limit is between nine and eleven hours for the day's ride, but not more than fifty hours are allowed for the total of 300 miles.

The army posts to be represented in the ride, according to Hayes, include: Fort Riley, Kan.; Fort Russell, Wyo.; Fort Sill, Okla.; Fort Sam Houston, Texas; Camp Travis, Texas; Fort Leavenworth, Kan.; with prospective entries from several others. The prizes include \$2,000 in cash, gold and silver cups, medals and ribbons.

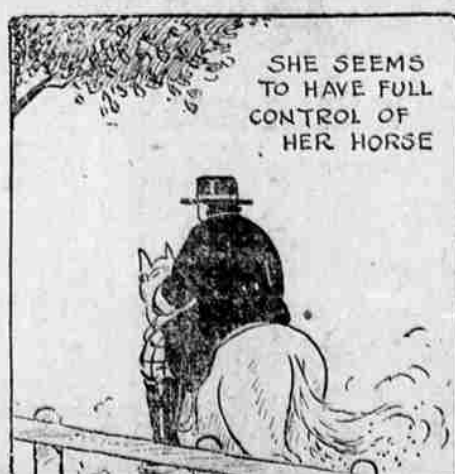

AFGHANS BECOME MODERN; INSTALL RADIO STATION

KABUL, Afghanistan, Aug. 1.—Citizens of Afghanistan, in their effort to become modern, have established a radio station at Kabul. This follows the opening of the first telegraphic communication between Afghanistan and India. There is now a telephone line from Kabul to Kandahar, and it is possible to travel by automobile between these cities.

Since the abolition of slavery in January of 1921, great strides have been made in education in Afghanistan. There is a new boys' school, caring for 150 youngsters, under 12 years of age, and a school for women, both at Kabul, and several in the provinces. Compulsory school attendance has been decreed.

The greatest difficulty before the new government is the finding of men competent to carry out its reforms. The old officials were strenuously opposed to these innovations, and it proved necessary, early in 1922, to depose at a single stroke all the provincial governors. The new officials no longer wear national costumes, but dress in amusingly correct European fashion. Their offices are equipped with modern desks and chairs, and government clerks have been forbidden to sit on the floor while performing their duties.
