STAYS LIMIT WITH ARGENTINE

Homer Smith Hits Floor 19 Times in Bout With Luis Angel Firpo

OMAHA, Aug. 6.—Luis Angel Firpo, giant of the Argentine, defeated Homer Smith, of Kalamazoo, Mich., in a ten-round bout here Friday night, gaining the referee's decision. It was the first time in the South American's career that he was forced to win via the decision route.

All his battles previously had been comparatively easy victories by knockouts.

Nineteen Knockdowns
Firpo knocked and battered Smith all about the arena with hard rights and uppercuts. Smith, although sent spinning to the canvas for a count of nine for no less than sixteen times, managed to stand off the anxious Firpo by clinching and dodging. Occasionally he shot long rights to the Argentine's face, but they lacked the punch. At no time during the fight did Firpo show any signs of distress.

Homer Takes His Rest

Smith was plainly cautious of Firpo's right and led the Argentine a chase from the beginning of the encounter. Firpo knocked Smith down five times for a count of nine each time in the sixth round. The South American seemed to score at will, but could not measure his man.

Smith, baffled by the Argentine by his clinching tactics in the seventh and eighth rounds, Firpo hit him with everything he had and after each blow Smith went down for a count of nine, jumping up spryly when the referee tolled the ninth count.

Not Ready For Dempsey
While newspaper men at the ringside declared that Firpo had won the bout with little or no effort

there was a general opinion that he showed a lack of ring generalship by not being able to corner the elusive Smith and land a knockout blow.

The general opinion expressed by fight fans and sport writers who have had occasion to watch Dempsey in action was that Firpo would have to improve considerably before having a chance against the Utah mauler.

They Pay \$7.50 For This
Although gate receipts for last night's match were not available it was announced by Pat Boyle, promoter, that Firpo's share of the purse totaled \$5,000, plus 40 percent of the gate receipts. Approximately 3,000 persons viewed the match. Prices of pasteboards ranged from \$2 to \$7.50.

Firpo's weight was announced 214 1/2 and Smith's at 188 1/2.

DEMPEY OPENS CAMP FOR FIRPO BATTLE

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, SARATOGA, N. Y., Aug. 6.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion of the world, has established training quarters here in preparation for his September 14 match with Luis Angel Firpo of the Argentine.

A rest for the week is the plan for Dempsey, to permit recovery from fatigue of the transcontinental trip. Then he will go on training hours.
