HUGE TOWER RISING ON PRAIRIE SITE GIVES NEBRASKA UNIQUE STATE HOUSE

A LEGISLATIVE MONUMENT

The new capitol under construction at Lincoln, Neb., marks a radical departure from the time-honored design which is nearly uniform in a majority of states. It is distinctly different. Instead of the usual dome, hallowed by custom, a magnificent tower, ornamented with sculptured figures, is the outstanding feature. It is eighty feet square, four hundred feet high, and it is said, will be visible for thirty miles on a clear day. The exterior is of Indiana limestone which comes all ready cut in blocks numbered and ready to swing into place. The main body of the structure is low—two stories and an attic, including the stone terrace, forms an exact square 437 feet long on each side. The architect is Bertram G. Goodhue, of New York, whose plans won in a national competition. Indiana limestone was selected after investigation and tests lasting over a year, as best combining the elegance and permanence desired. The site is the original ten-acre square selected when the first capitol was erected on the prairie "at a city to be called Lincoln."

MISAPPROPRIATION OF FUNDS DENIED BY MISS FAY SLACK

Amount Was Sent From Her Post-office But Failed To Reach Destination, Is Claim

That she misappropriated funds at Hildebrand was denied today by Miss Fay Slack, former postmistress, who declares the report of the alleged defalcation was all wrong.

Miss Slack said \$332 was lost in transit from Hildebrand to Dalry, and that she is held on \$2,000 bail pending a court hearing. She was given to understand by Postal Inspector Arnold D. Brunner, who said, that she was held more for a witness, and that it was all but a matter of form.

The amount was sent from her postoffice to Dalry, but on return card was received from the latter postoffice, said Miss Slack. She can prove, she declared, that the money left her postoffice. What became of the money she was unable to say. She is entirely innocent of any wrongful act in connection with postoffice affairs, and this will be shown when the matter comes into court, she says.

The report that she gave a check for the amount alleged missing, and then attempted to cover the check was Saturday. Mrs. W. L. 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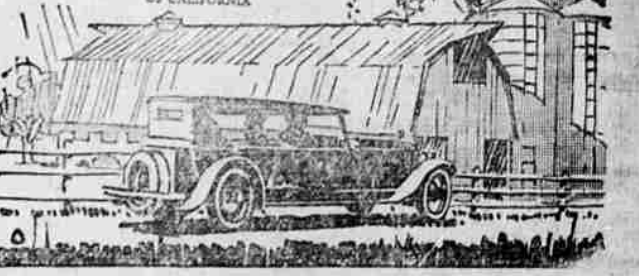
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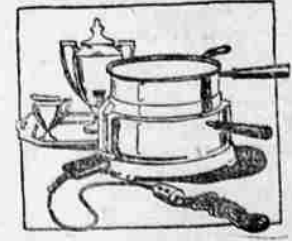
