

SCIENTISTS TO MEET SEPT. 17

Many From All Parts of U. S. and Abroad To Discuss Coming Eclipse

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—Scientists from many parts of the United States and a number from abroad are expected to attend the seventy-seventh meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science which will open a four day session at the University of Southern California here beginning September 17.

The eclipse of the sun, which will be total in parts of Southern California on September 16, is expected to be the main topic of discussion. The eclipse also is expected to bring many noted scientists who otherwise might not attend.

Officers of the association include Charles D. Wolcott, president, Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D. C., and Burton E. Livingston, permanent secretary, director of the department of botanical research, Carnegie Institution, Tucson, Ariz.

The Pacific division of the association will hold its seventh convention here in conjunction with the national organization's meeting and will have charge of the program and other details. This will be the first time the national gathering has been held on the Pacific Coast.

Officers of the Pacific division who are expected include: E. P. Lewis, president, professor of physics, University of California; C. E. Grunsky, vice president, San Francisco, and W. W. Sargeant, secretary-treasurer, California Academy of Science.

The Southwestern division officers who have promised to attend are: V. M. Slipper, president, Lowell Observatory, Flagstaff, Ariz., and Earl B. Working, secretary, Tucson, Ariz.

FLAPPER WIVES KILL GROCERIES; DELICATESSEN KINGS GET RICH

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Flapper brides are killing the corner grocery and putting delicatessen keepers in Millionaires' Row.

The old-fashioned housewife, who used to cook three square meals a day and never used canned goods except what she put up herself, is passing in New York, at least—where there are almost as many delicatessen shops as taxicabs, and grocery stores go out of business almost daily.

"Kitchennette apartments are to blame," say the brides.

"Not only young wives, but old ones, too, have the delicatessen habit," say shopkeepers.

The modern bride doesn't spend the delicatessen habit," say shopkeepers.

The modern bride doesn't spend the day over a hot stove. Instead, she works or goes to the movies. And on the way home she stops in at the delicatessen where she orders two slices of pinky-pink ham, two stuffed mangoes and a pint of potato salad. She and George eat it off the card table most every night.

The result is all oriental rugs and motor cars for the delicatessen keeper, but doom for the grocery store man. Only a few days ago one of the most exclusive grocery establishments in the Columbus avenue dis-

trict closed.

"Don't blame us," says Mrs. Roy Mangum, bride of a year and apartment dweller.

"Our husbands work downtown. In order to make expenses we have to live in tiny apartments. The kitchennette, when there is one, is generally off the living room and takes up about as much space as an old-fashioned sewing table.

"Who wants to cook there? Who could? Eating out all the time is expensive. The delicatessen is our only salvation. Even at that, my mother marvels at the meals that can be evolved from one gas flame and a can opener."

"The delicatessen is really Cupid in disguise," says Mrs. Charles Heartfield. "At least half of my friends are business women who go right on working after marriage. They haven't time to prepare elaborate meals and yet they want a home. The delicatessen tides them over many a rough place."

Albert Riehl, for nearly 20 years a leading grocer in the delicatessen district, cannily prepared himself for the changing conditions.

"I saw it coming 20 years ago," he says. "You can't get servants any more. Living costs have gone up. People have to live in hotels or these little shoe box apartments. I don't blame the women for not

wanting to stay cooped up."

A few blocks away on the other side of the street Sol Schnapp, delicatessen owner, beamed joyfully.

"Nineteen years ago," said Schnapp. "I started my first store at 64th street and Broadway. There wasn't another one till you got uptown to 110th street and there wasn't another one downtown till you got to 14th street and Sixth avenue.

"Now look at it. A delicatessen in every block except when there's two in a block. My company itself owns 16 stores.

"Sure, the brides did it. Suppose a fellow earning \$30 a week marries a girl making \$25 a week. They can't live on his salary. They both have to go on working. Well, she hasn't time to cook. They buy their things in the delicatessen."

British Encouraged By Oil Drilling Successes

LONDON, Aug. 5.—The success of recent oil-drilling operations in the northern counties of England and in Scotland have led to new drilling operations on a larger scale. The oil found, while not abundant, is claimed to be of the finest heavy grade and has led many geologists to believe that asphalt deposits lie in this section.

Oil has been found in Derbyshire, Staffordshire and Middlethian. At Hardstoft, Derbyshire, a well drilled about a year ago has produced a thousand tons of heavy oil and the well is still flowing. Five other wells in this section have shown traces of oil but have not yet been pumped.

Indications of oil have been found in the Staffordshire coal mines, but prospects are not believed encouraging for the operator.

Most of the test wells have been

drilled by the government in order to prove the theory that oil exists in many of the sections of the British Isles. English operators believe that while the result of the drilling so far is not what was looked for, it is possible to produce oil in commercial quantities.
