

CITIZEN POLICE OF IOWA CLEAR STATE OF OUTLAW BANDS

DES MOINES, Aug. 13.—Iowa, which for many years was the stamping ground of bank robbers, apparently has become the "no-man's land" for bandits and outlaws...

The state bankers' association, which is responsible for the organization of the vigilantes, recently reported that during the six months ending July 1 there was not a bank robbery in Iowa—a record unsurpassed in recent years in the hawk-eye state.

Losses sustained by banks and customers in 56 robberies during 1924, before the vigilantes were organized, totaled \$228,973.84. During the following year, when the vigilantes were just getting underway, there were 30 robberies and losses of \$54,941.85.

The record of Iowa, the only state having such an organization, has attracted the attention of bankers and authorities throughout the states and a number, who have visited here obtained a working knowledge of the system with a view of having it introduced in their own states.

The vigilantes, armed with army pistols and rifles or sawed-off shot-guns and the authority of deputy sheriffs, are, for the most part, ex-service men, trained in the use of guns. They are subject to call 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

The vigilantes operate in 800 of the 1,000 towns in the state which have banks. The organization is spreading and probably will be in operation in the other 200 towns before the year is ended.

Banks in each of the 99 counties of the state have pledged the payment of at least \$1,000 for the capture or information leading to the arrest and conviction of robbers or burglars attempting to rob or burglarize a bank.

Several counties have equipped their vigilantes with armored automobiles. One county has barricades erected at intersecting roads, from behind which the bandits are due for a rain of lead, should they pass that way.

STORY OF STRANGE HONOR CODE TOLD

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 13.—The story of a strange honor code is being told here, following the recapture of Mike Donnelly, several years ago a red-shirt man at the state penitentiary.

Donnelly was sent up for life in 1911, according to Detective Chester Edwards who tells the story, and some years after that, with two thrilling escapes to his credit, the negro prisoner was wearing a red shirt to signify that he was a bad prisoner.

"Mike," he said, "I've decided to make a trusty out of you. I'm going to put you on the outside gate. You'll have every chance in the world to escape from there if you wish to betray my confidence."

Donnelly hesitated not a second, according to Detective Edwards.

"Warden, don't tempt me," he answered, according to Detective Edwards. "I'm going to escape from this prison the first chance I get but I don't want to go that way."

"Donnelly went back to his work in the jute mill and a narrow cell with chances of escape slim, when he might have had a soft trusty's job and the way to freedom open, all because he wouldn't break his word," the detective commented.
