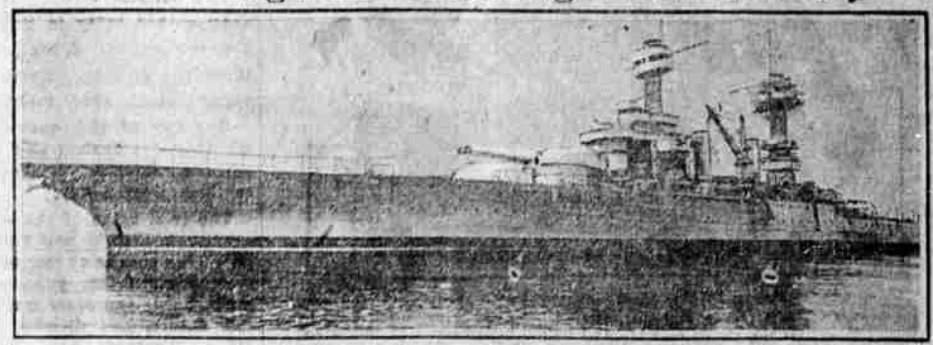

The U. S. S. Colorado is being made ship-shape at Philadelphia and soon will start on a trial cruise. She is 624 feet long, displaces 22,600 tons and has a speed of 21 knots. She is an oil burner with two 15,000-horse-power steam turbines supplying electric current for 8000-horse-power motors which drive her propellers. She will be manned by 1403 officers and men.

 length of time."

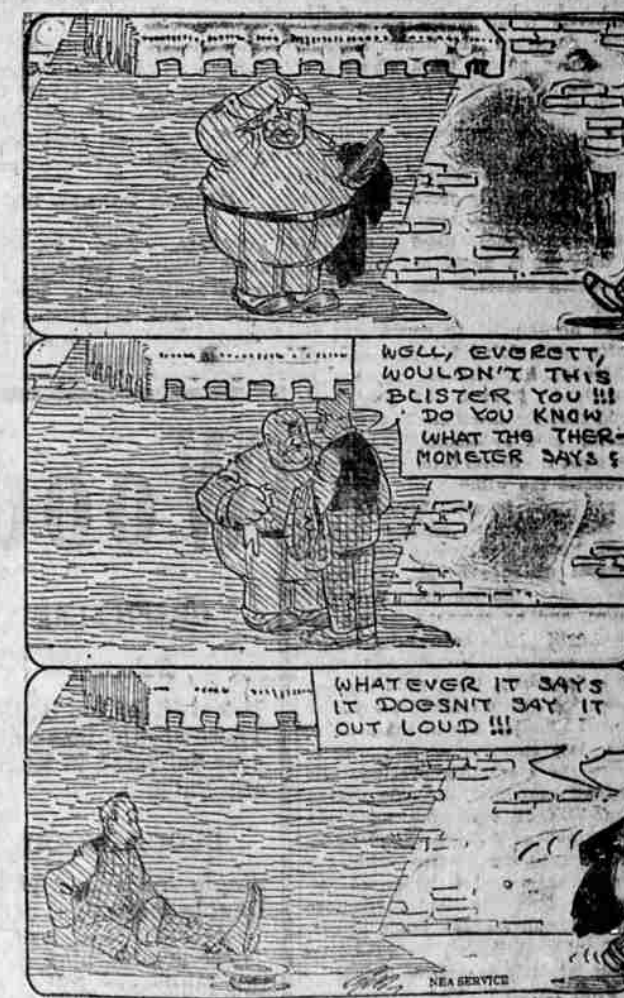
