AIRPLANE MAIL SERVICE TESTS STARTED TODAY

Coast To Coast Flights Inaugurated To Demonstrate Feasibility of Service

HEMPSTEAD, N. Y., Aug. 21.—With one plane flying from San Francisco to New York, another took off from Hazelhurst field, Long Island, today for the Pacific Coast relay in the first of the five days' tests inaugurated by the government to demonstrate the feasibility of permanent transcontinental air mail service.

Notice of the experimental operation of airplanes for a coast to coast mail service was received here by Postmaster John A. McCall in an official bulletin from the postoffice department.

Postmasters not located on the air route" says the bulletin, "may dispatch mail for this service. The dispatch during the experimental flights only will be two cents an ounce, and letters should be marked 'via air mail from—', or 'via air mail to—'."

The postal service is about to issue a new series of air mail postage stamps of 8-cent, 16-cent and 24-cent denominations, intended primarily for use in the new night flying, but the stamps will be valid for all purposes for which postage stamps of the regular issue are used.

PRESIDENT MOVES INTO WHITE HOUSE

Visitors Hold That Some of War Time Prisoners Are Receiving Just Punishment

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—President and Mrs. Coolidge moved into the white house late today.

The president told white house visitors today that he had decided to adopt a "reasonable" attitude in the matter of clemency for wartime law violators, but that he recognized that some of those still imprisoned were only receiving just punishment for the crimes of which they were convicted.

STEVENSON RESIGNS

Offer of Oakland Chamber of Commerce Is Accepted

The resignation of T. A. Stevenson, secretary of the chamber of commerce, was formally tendered and accepted by the board of directors today.

W. O. Smith, president of the chamber, said the board regrets the loss of Stevenson, whose services of the past year and a half have been of inestimable value to the chamber and to the community.

Stevenson said he regretted leaving at this time, when Klamath Falls is on the verge of the greatest period of growth of its history, but that he thought it wise to accept the offer, since the Oakland chamber is one of the largest and most progressive on the coast and success there means a stepping stone to a higher position.

No successor has been selected for the position, but several are under consideration.

NEW ORDINANCE FOR TRAFFIC IS UP TO COUNCIL

Restricted Parking Areas Are Established; Truck Travel Regulated

The new ordinance, drafted last week by the street committee, was presented to the city council last night and was read by title.

No vehicle shall park on Main street between Second and Eleventh, or on Sixth between Main and Klamath, for a longer period of time, at one time, than two hours.

On Main and Klamath, and on Pine from Third to Eleventh, and on cross streets from Pine to Klamath, vehicles shall park by driving into the curb, and shall be pointed in the direction of traffic at an angle of 30 degrees.

On all other streets and alleys vehicles shall park parallel to the curb.

No vehicle shall park on the easterly side of Fifth street between Main and Klamath.

Trucks shall not park on Main from Second to Eleventh, or on Fifth between Main and Klamath.

Trucks and heavily loaded vehicles shall not travel on Main between Eleventh and Second, except to come to Main to unload, when they shall proceed along Main to nearest intersection in the direction of traffic and leave Main.

The washing of vehicles on public streets or alleys is prohibited.

The council refused to reconsider its rejection of the Bend Concrete Company's concrete sewer pipe, which was rejected at the meeting last week on the ground that the local pipe did not meet requirements.

MASKED BANDITS ROB MAIL TRAIN

20 Registered Packages Obtained; Fireman Badly Beaten, May Die

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 21.—Five masked bandits looted the mail and express cars of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas passenger train near Okesa, Okla., shortly after midnight and escaped with 20 registered packages after overcoming the train crew.

The bandits beat B. D. Trowers, fireman of the train, over the head with a revolver. Trower is in a hospital, probably with a fractured skull.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 21.—Four bandits held up the Belvedere state bank at Belvedere Gardens today. They fired a fusillade and escaped with \$4,000 in an automobile.

BANDITS ROB CLUBMEN

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 21.—Two armed and masked bandits entered the Seventh Battalion club on Granville street here today, held up a score of card players and 45 minutes later escaped with over \$10,000.
