ASSURE BURIAL FOR DESTITUTE

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 23.—Consecration of a burial plot for former soldiers of the British army who may die here in destitute circumstances will take place September 1, when a piece of land on a sunny hillside in Inglewood cemetery will be dedicated by the Right Reverend Joseph Johnson, bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Los Angeles.

Purchased by the Canadian Woman's club five months ago, the plot already holds the bodies of five British veterans of the world war, who otherwise would have found their last resting places in the potter's field. Space for 95 other graves remains.

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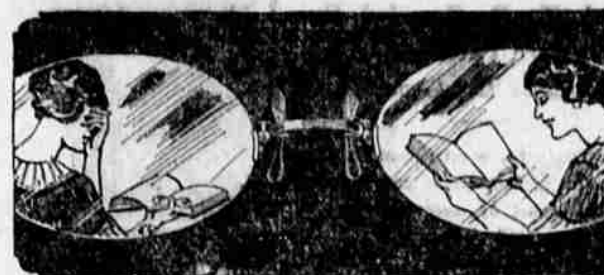
