PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, Aug. 25.—Pending the appointment by the state department of a financial adviser to the republic of Haiti, Achilles J. Manmus was appointed receiver general of customs for Haiti in 1916.

QUARRELS OF ARABIA FOUGHT IN CARDIFF

This was the case recently when 800 Arabian stokers made the dockfront the scene of an attempt to settle tribal differences finding their origin on the shores of the Red sea. White dockers and sailors took their hands out of their pockets, spat on them, and leaped into the thick of it without asking whether it was a private battle or a free-for-all.

Four policemen came at a run and dutifully attacked the 800. Their truncheons made no impression on the mass, but they went on with their task. Knives began to flash, and brown-skinned Orientals went

dashing through the dockyards seeking reinforcements of their clansmen. The Chamari tribesmen were settling an old grudge with the Adenese.

At the note of a whistle the four bobbies fell back to join 20 others who had come up in a motor-lorry. The 24 charged.

The Arabs then scattered, the police close on their heels picking up stragglers. The sad and battered company that rode away in the police van was composed of many tribes, but there was no fight left in them.

sold by the Japanese tobacco monopoly at high prices.

In 1922, according to the Japan Economist, approximately 1,155,000 bales of this tobacco were thus treated and the amount will be exceeded this year.
