PROSPECTS BRIGHT FOR COMPLETION OF SUMMER L. PROJECT

Engineers Are Now Drawing Plans and Specifications, Reports Lakeview Attorney

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Aug. 28.—

Bright prospects for the early completion of the Summer lake irrigation project are foreshadowed by Charles H. Comb, local attorney, who has just returned from a conference at Bend with the engineers who are drawing plans and specifications for the irrigation system.

According to the new plans, which are yet to be approved by the directors of the district, the water in the dam will be raised to the 42-foot level and a pump installed which will pump sufficient water to irrigate 3000 acres. When needed an additional pump can be installed which will pump water to irrigate 3,000 acres more, which is the total irrigable acreage under the original project plans.

The district has voted more bonds to the amount of \$135,000 for the completion of the project. Proceedings have been started in

the circuit court to confirm this issue and the hearing is set for September 19, according to Comb. Following the action of the circuit court it will be up to the state securities commission to approve the issue and guarantee the interest. After that, work will be started and the water should be on the land by the next crop year, Comb said.
