In the Courts

Funk vs. Pauline Lumber Co.

Twenty-four pages are required for the complaint filed in the circuit court this morning by Frank H. Funk and Mr. and Mrs. W. F. McCloud against the Pauline White Pine Lumber company and the G. W. Gates Lumber company. Plaintiffs ask judgment for 10 cents, totaling \$2101.60, and for \$61 attorneys' fees, and costs of the suit. The amounts are alleged due for labor performed, and foreclosure of labor liens is asked.

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MURRAY FILES DAMAGE SUIT AGAINST TEN

another point raised in the present complaint to support plaintiff's charges.

Murray Claimed Property

The chief bone of contention was certain equipment that had been transferred from the Record to the Herald office, which Murray claimed, under the contract, became his property when Belding and West failed to keep their agreement. Attachments against this property were issued, which Murray claims were never served by Sheriff Low, and charges that the sheriff sought to remedy his neglect by illegal seizure of the property forms another angle of the conspiracy charge.

When Hawkins failed to procure the property, recourse was had to Judge Kuykendall, who issued a writ of mandamus against the sheriff directing that he bring the property into court. Murray refused to recognize the writ, demanding that he be brought before the court for contempt and later petitioning the court to be made a party to the mandamus proceedings, but this right the present complaint alleges. Judge Kuykendall refused to grant. It is alleged that he advised Murray's attorneys that he would be granted no hearing until he turned the property over to the sheriff, and this Murray refused to do.

Writ of Replevin

The next step was a writ of replevin, which was served by Coroner Whitlock. This writ was recognized by Murray, who then put up a redelivery bond, which left the property in question still in his possession. When the sheriff still failed to get possession of the property, he asked for a dismissal of the replevin suit, which was granted over Murray's protest, his attorneys being present and advising the court, according to the complaint, that the bond had been posted and accepted. The order, which appears in the complaint, sets forth that no steps had been taken to secure the property and that the defendant, Murray, had not been represented in court.

It was in the effort to gain possession of this property by Deputy Sheriff Hawkins and assistants that the gun was drawn. Murray was arrested, indicted, and placed under bonds to keep the peace, all of which, he now claims, was illegal and unwarranted oppression. Eventually the whole matter came

to a head in 1922, after Judge Kuykendall's resignation, when Judge C. F. Stone was temporarily on the bench to fill the vacancy, in the trial of a suit filed by Murray, asking that Belding and West be compelled to abide by their contract.

In Murray's Favor

The court, found in Murray's favor and he secured the Record stock. This trial loosed the entire jam, and the multitudinous suits were soon after dismissed.

Later, after Judge Leavitt mounted the circuit bench, Murray was tried by a jury on the charge of assaulting an officer and quickly acquitted.

It was generally supposed that these victories in the circuit court had satisfied the former publisher, and this echo of the old feud comes as a surprise to most people. The suit for damages will be tried before the federal court at Portland.

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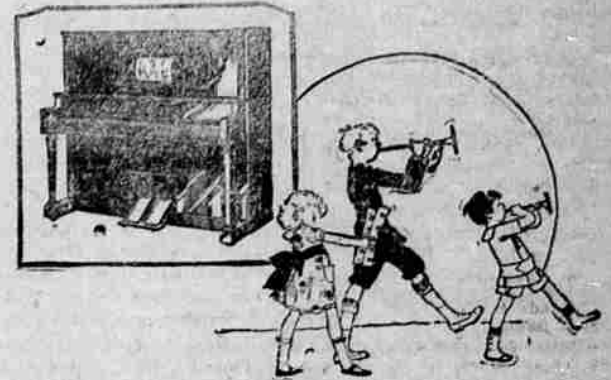
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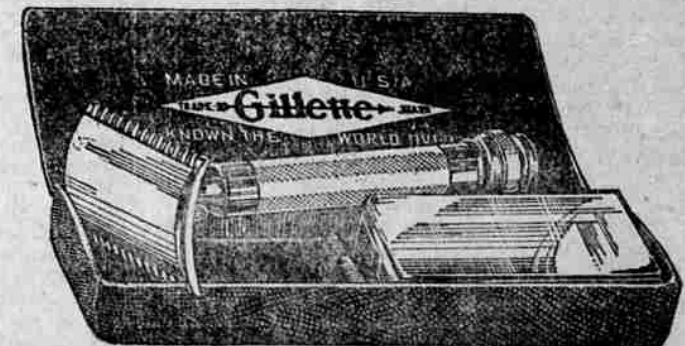
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
