SAYS CARDINAL TEAM STRONGER

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Aug. 31.—"Stanford's football material at the present time does not seem to be the equal either in quantity or quality of the material available for the 1922 squad," says Andy Kerr, Cardinal coach. "But this does not mean that Stanford will have either a weaker or an equally strong grid team this season. If evolution is true in football, as I believe it to be, Stanford will have a stronger team this season in spite of weaker material and should be able to win her share of conference games. The outcome will depend, of course, upon the ability of the remaining candidates to build and to improve upon the foundation laid last year."

Kerr is neither pessimistic nor optimistic and neither does he make large assurances or remain non-committal. He says it would be worse than useless for him to take any particular stand other than that Stanford will be doing her best to the bitter end. He has, however, done his best in the way of predictions and after drawing a general average on a basis of luck, shows good reason why Stanford ought to be an improved machine this season.

If Kerr were to play a game today, local experts say, the line he would pick without doubt be as follows: George Baker at center with Bob Hunt in reserve, Bob Cravens and Dick Paville at the guards, Harry Shipkey and Fred Ludeke at the tackles, and Norman Dole and A. B. Thomas at the ends. Armour and Rogers would play in reserve for the guards, Loomis and Nell would sub for the tackles, while McDermott, Heiser, and Middleton could go in at end. All the first string men played at least half the games last season and Paville and Cravens have been regulars for two years. Of the entire first line, Baker is the most inexperienced, but he will be a worthy replacement, even for Bud DeGroot, last year's captain.

The backfield will have to be almost entirely built over, experts agree. Of last year's squad, there are only three quarterbacks and three reserve halfbacks remaining. Captain "Scott" Campbell will probably draw first-string quarter position, backed by Bud Woodward and Gil Wheat. New candidates for this place will be "Mugs" Mitchell from the 1922 babe team, Nick Kirwan, Mitchell's substitute, and Dick Lawson, who was ineligible last year. As to the halves, both Wilcox and Doughty have served their time. Paul Murray, Norman Cleveland, and Guy Dennis, former reserves, will now have to bear the responsibility of regular positions. Hamilton, Roberts, Frazier and Dwight will be chief

ENGLAND PREPARING FOR NEXT OLYMPIAD

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Britain has set out to win the next Olympiad and, if the trick is not pulled off, it will not be the fault of the English public in general which is giving its money to send a crack team to the games in 1924. It has been generally admitted that England has lost much of her athletic supremacy during the last decade, and to regain this a leading London newspaper has started a campaign for \$200,000, the sum estimated as necessary to get together a team and send it to the Paris games next year.

Of the numerous candidates for fallback to replace Murray Cuddeback, the Cardinal's chief scorer last season, Ernie Nevers, 190 pound full from last season's freshman team, seems to be favored. His competition will consist of Fred Solomon, Clifford Hey, Jim Kelley, C. C. Stratton and Robert Wright.

DAVIS CUP WILL BE DEFENDED BY AMERICA TODAY

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 31.—The Davis cup, a trophy that has welded ties of friendship between many of the great nations of the world through their tennis players, a trophy sought this year by 17 nations outside the United States, is to be defended today on the turf courts of the West Side club's concrete stadium by the Americans.

The nations that played for the cup this year were divided into two zones for the preliminary play. Canada, Japan, Hawaii and Australia were assigned to the American zone. Japan defeated the Canadians at Toronto, Australia won from the Hawaiians at Orange, N. J., then defeated Japan at Chicago.

In the European zone France was victorious against Spain in the final round, winning the right to play Australia in the United States for the honor of challenging America for the cup. Czechoslovakia, Switzerland, India, Ireland, Argentina, France, Denmark, Spain, Rumania, Belgium, the British Isles, Italy and Holland were represented in the European zone.

This field made up the greatest that ever competed for the cup

since it was donated in 1900 by Dwight W. Davis of Washington, D. C., now president of the United States Lawn Tennis association and assistant secretary of war. Australia won the cup six times, as did America, while Great Britain held it five times.

ROCKNE TUTORS FOOTBALL COACHES FROM 20 STATES

NOTRE DAME, Ind., Aug. 31.—Approximately 100 football coaches are enrolled in the coaching school being conducted at the University of Notre Dame by Knute K. Rockne, director of athletics.

Only football is being studied by the men under the direction of the

man who generally is accredited with having been the leader in the development of the forward pass. No fundamental of the game will be left out, according to Rockne. The class will be in session throughout August.

Twenty states are represented by those attending the school. More than 30 college mentors are studying under the Notre Dame leader with the hope that they, too, may absorb some of his ability to develop winning football eleven. High school football instructors also are

going in for the class, men from 37 schools being in attendance.

Coach Rockne is devoting four hours a day to the class. Half of the time is given to blackboard work and two hours to practical exhibitions on the gridiron.
