MACHINERY OF LEAGUE BREAKS DOWN IN TEST

by the league, because it was the ambassadorial body which had appointed the mission to fix the frontier between Albania and Greece. That body was the living organization of the great peace conference and was empowered with the execution of the terms of the treaties.

Greece Is Accused

The head of the Italian delegation accused Greece with cleverly seeking to escape from her responsibility and diverting world attention from the murder of the Italian officers to Italy's seizure of Corfu, by denouncing this seizure as an act of dangerous aggression.

It was not Signor Salandra, but Mussolini who seemed to be addressing the council of the league at its dramatic session. As the good natured appearing former premier read his fateful message, the crowded council chamber thought to hear in fancy not the voice of Salandra, but that of his fascist chief and leader, who has suddenly loomed up on the stage of Europe.

League Held Incompetent

No state would wish to belong to the league read Signor Salandra, if membership meant renunciation of the right to defend its national dignity. Italy had not menaced world peace and there was not sufficient reason for the application of the articles of the covenant cited by Greece, which were founded on the supposition that danger of war existed. Until the ambassadorial body pronounced judgment, he contended, any action by the league was out of place because of the league's evident incompetency.

Athens Welcomes Probe

M. Politis remarked that the Greek government repudiated energetically any allegation that it was morally or materially responsible for the odious crime committed on its territory. Greece, he declared, did not wish to evade the prerogatives of the council of ambassadors, but, on the contrary, had asked that the council pursue an investigation. Italy, however, in bombarding Corfu, had created a situation which justified Greece in appealing to the league.

M. Politis insisted that in his suggestion that the league council appoint a neutral commission to inquire into the crime, Greece was using common sense and trying to be fair all around, for his proposed league commission could proceed with its work in conjunction with the ambassadors' council. Not only Greece, but Italy, was bound under the circumstances to refer the dispute to the league of nations, both in letter and spirit the covenant of the league demanded it. If the council of the league accepted the Italian point of view, then, said M. Politis, it was tantamount to ruin of the pact of the league.

Cecil Warns Members

Lord Robert Cecil's quietly voiced warning that if the treaty of Versailles, of which the covenant of the league is an integral part, was to be disregarded, the reorganization of Europe was endangered, has caused a profound impression and has served to emphasize the gravity of the political crisis in which Europe is plunged. The council chamber was crowded with visitors, including Americans, and Lord Robert's warning statement was received with vigorous hand clapping.

"Once again," said a Swiss newspaper, "events demonstrate that we can impose peace only by war. So long as the league of nations has no powerful army it will only keep

HELLO GIRLS SUPPLY WEATHER FORECASTS

LONDON, Sept. 7.—Pity the poor English telephone girls. They are supposed to be able to tell people what the weather will be like. In this, their newest duty, perhaps they will receive a sigh or two of sympathy from the operators of switchboards in America who for many years bore the suffering of having subscribers ring up to ask "What time is it, please? My clock has stopped."

Not long ago the Post Office, which owns all the telephones in Great Britain, arranged with the Air Ministry to supply each exchange with daily forecasts of the weather and on the first day that this information was available to subscribers 10,172 persons called up to find out if it was going to rain. Of course it usually was, a wet one. In London most of the inquiries were made on Fridays and Saturdays.

This was taken to mean that the only time people really care about climate over here is when they are set for an outing. The rest of the time they cannot be bothered, let the fogs fall where they may.

Besides it is cheaper not to care. The postoffice is not giving away tips on the weather for the mere fun of it. Those who get such information from "Central" must pay two-pence, the cost of a regular city call.

Hardly anyone troubles to ring up and find out the time. Maybe minutes do not mean so much in this easy-going land as in the supposedly "snappy" United States.

WATERCRESS RICH IN FOOD VALUE, SPECIALIST ASSERTS

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., Sept. 7.—Watercress as a side dish for lunch, is well known in most households but few people eating it were aware that it contained all the essential vitamins, until this fact was stated by Dr. Harold Searfield at a medical Association meeting recently. He advocated a more extensive use of the vegetable and said that the Greeks regarded it as food for the mind, while today it was regarded as a stimulant for the body.

This recalls a favorite experiment of Professor Vivian B. Lewes, explosive expert. When lecturing he used to fill a glass jar with watercress, take it to Greenwich hospital and leave it on the roof in the sun's rays. The next week it would be brought back to the lecture room, the cover removed, and a light placed near the opening with the result that a deafening explosion occurred. This proved, according to the professor, that watercress was composed of pure oxygen and therefore very beneficial to the human system.

JAIL DELIVERY STIRS SOFIA

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Sept. 7.—One of the most sensational jail deliveries in the history of Balkan politics came to light here in the announcement by the Director of Public Safety that two prisoners, taken during the seizure of all Stamboulsky henchmen, had escaped.

Director Natcheff said two civilians went to the jail where Krum Popoff, former Mayor of Sofia, and Stoyan Kalcheff, private secretary to the late Premier Stamboulsky, were prisoners. What appeared to be regular documents were shown and the pair were released, supposedly for examination.

All search has failed to locate either the escorts or the former prisoners.

RUSSIAN AUTHOR FINDS REFUGE IN BARREN CRIMEA

SIMFERPOL, Crimea, Sept. 7.—In a little hut high up in the mountains some 50 miles from Simferopol, S. Sergeyeff Zensky, one of Russia's most widely known authors, is today living the life of a hermit.

To an Associated Press correspondent Zensky related recently the difficulties of being a hermit during a revolution, and spoke of his adventures during the numerous changes of regimes and the famine year in the Crimea.

"The famine here was very acute," he said. "The land had been devastated by civil war and numerous risings. It completed the ruin, and carried away a large portion of the population which was already depleted by the upheaval and by terror."

"I lived here quite happily from 1913 until the beginning of 1918. Then the Germans raided my little farm, and later the bolsheviks. I had to take refuge in town, where I lived in hiding for a couple of months until I was able to secure from the authorities a 'guarantee of safety' paper. My livestock and

cattle, which were confiscated during the period of my absence, were given back to me on my return, but they were unfit for work. Other changes of regimes, coupled with innumerable Tartar risings, have each had their interests, and now the result is quite evident."

Pointing to a pile of timber and short beams in a corner of the room, Zensky said: "That, together with this little hut and one cow, is all that remains of my farm; all I have to leave to my family."

"Please tell the American people," continued Zensky, "that the Crimean population greatly admires the disinterested and self-sacrificing work of the American relief administration, as well as the humanitarian feelings of the American people. We are indeed grateful."

S. Sergeyeff Zensky is one of the few Russian writers who stayed in Russia all through the years of revolution and civil war. He lives today the hard life of a poor man, and is cut off from the world of culture. He writes a great deal, and has just completed a romance entitled "Transfiguration," which deals with the development of Russia.

PREVENT ACCIDENTS WHICH CAUSE LOSS OF EYESIGHT, AIM

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—Because of the growing seriousness of accidents in public places and in homes, as well as in industry, as a cause of blindness, the National Committee for the prevention of blindness announced today that it would undertake immediately a progressive census of all eye accidents with a view of determining means of prevention. This decision, the committee declares, grew out of the recent realization that there has come about a radical change in the incidence of the various principal causes of blindness.

The committee has discovered, for instance, that whereas not many years ago the greatest single cause of blindness in children was "babies' sore eyes," the percentage of blindness from this cause has been cut in half. Blindness caused by accidents of various sorts, on the other hand, has increased to such an extent in recent years that accidents now constitute the most serious single cause of blindness.

An effort will be made to secure a record of every accident causing an injury to the eye whether it

occurs in a factory, in a home, or on the street. This census will gradually be extended into every state in the Union. The results will be tabulated by principal causes and analyzed monthly. A month to month comparison of the records of this census will enable the committee and its many cooperating agencies throughout the country to learn whether—as is now believed—the number of cases of blindness through accidents is steadily increasing and against what causes of accidents the energies of the committee should be directed.
