

WAY PAVED FOR CELEBRATION CANVASSERS

Solicitors Met With Checks Already Filled Out and Signed

Members of the celebration funds committee found publicity had paved their way when they started to canvass the business district this morning. Many business men, having read the committee's letter, expected to give, had checks already made out. Others were ready to make them out without further argument.

Only a few turned down the canvassers absolutely. Some were out of town, others unable to contribute at the moment, but the majority showed their belief in the logic of a celebration by coming across with the full amount asked of them.

Not all the canvassers had finished at noon, and Earl Whitlock, chairman, said there was such a mass of checks and memoranda of donors to be gone through that he was unable at press time to state the amount actually subscribed.

The committee will hold a meeting this evening, at which a financial report will be made.

FISH BUREAU MARKS 100,000 FINGERLINGS; WILL STUDY HABITS

Reward of One Dollar Will Be Paid For Information in Future

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 13.—One hundred thousand fish have been marked for identification purposes before being released from the hatcheries at Bonneville and Tascor creek, on the Columbia river, this season, H. D. Holmes of the United States bureau of fisheries reported while here on a recent inspection trip. This identification is part of extensive research work the bureau has been conducting for years.

About 500 Chinook salmon, most of which were five years old, have been found and identified as previously marked hatchery offspring so far this year. They are marked by cutting two or three fins when they are as small as two inches in length. A reward of one dollar is given for the recovery of each fish so marked.

One thing learned from the research is that the salmon return for spawning to the waters from which they were liberated, rather than to the waters from which the eggs were taken, when the eggs are transferred, Holmes said. Microscopic study of the scales of the fish is being made, he said, for further data, as the scales are ringed much as a tree is and show the length of time the fish spend in both fresh and salt water. The expense of this research is met jointly by the state and federal governments.

\$350 FINE COLLECTED FOR HAVING LIQUOR; DEFENDANT DISARMED

B. C. Martine Changes Plea To Guilty; Chief Retains Two Guns

B. C. Martine, proprietor of the Roslyn rooming house, charged with the possession of liquor, experienced a change of mind and heart, after a jury to try him had been chosen in the justice court yesterday afternoon, and changed his plea from not guilty to guilty.

Whereupon Judge Emmitt imposed a fine of \$350, which he paid.

When Martine was arrested the police seized, besides liquor, two revolvers, fully loaded, which they say they found on the premises.

After the payment of \$350 had regained him liberty, Martine demanded the guns back, but Chief of Police Humphrey decided the department would hold the arsenal.

Martine was inclined to be insistent, but the chief pointed out that as an alien Martine had no right to the weapons. Martine left his armament in the police station.

EXHIBITORS AT STOCK SHOW "FRAME" JUDGE; HE BUYS THE CIGARS

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 13.—Professor Howard Hackadorn of the Washington State college bowed to defeat as a judge of stock for the first time in 15 years when a party of exhibitors "framed" one on him at the Spokane interstate fair, last week.

When the senior and grand champion ewe was to be announced, they sent in a wether to compete. Judge Hackadorn studied for some time and finally announced the male animal as the winner. The royal purple champion ribbon had been awarded the joke was disclosed. The show was stopped for two minutes while the judge set up the cigars to the boys present.

LEGION WILL BATTLE REDS

All Posts Asked To Observe Constitution Week and Fight Radicalism

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 13.—Revolutionary radicalism, bolshevism, I. W. W. and similar movements, would become almost obsolete, if the people of the United States really understood the constitution, Garland W. Powell, director of the Americanism commission of the American Legion declared in a recent bulletin to workers in his organization. Powell's statement was embodied in a request he made to legion posts to join in observance of Constitution Anniversary Week, Sept. 17 to 22, in conjunction with other organizations.

"The constitution insures to the people of our nation those inalienable rights, life, liberty and pursuit of happiness," says Powell's statement. "No country since the beginning of time has held these ideals higher than the people of the United States yet very few Americans know what the constitution contains," the bulletin continues.

"It is the duty of every American citizen, as well as those who hope to become citizens, to know and fully understand the Constitution of the United States of America. People cannot be law abiding citizens or stand for law and order when they do not know the fundamental principles upon which the laws of their land are based. We can only be a uniform nation by understanding the rights guaranteed to citizens under the constitution."

Powell seeks to have leaders of Americanism work in the legion cooperate to the fullest extent with all agencies observing the constitution's anniversary and to further coordinate the legion's efforts in teaching and explaining the instrument.

NEW LEGION HEAD IS GRADUATE OF U. OF O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Sept. 13.—Frederick E. Kiddle of Island City, newly elected state commander of the American Legion, was prominent in student affairs at the University of Oregon in his undergraduate days. He obtained the degree of bachelor of science in 1917, completing his major work in the school of business administration.

Kiddle prepared for the University at La Grande high school. In college he became a member of Sigma Nu fraternity, To-Ko-Lo-sophomore society and Alpha Kappa Psi, national commerce fraternity. Because of his active participation in undergraduate activities he was elected to Eta Psi, senior honor society.

Spanish Army Revolts Against Government; Martial Law Is Declared In Several Cities

Proclamation Issued At Barcelona Says Military Movement Is Directed Against Professional Politicians, and Does Not Indicate Disloyalty To King.

MADRID, Sept. 13.—A military officer at Barcelona has revolted and martial law is declared. The rank and file of the army joined the revolt but the navy personnel is quiet. The cabinet issued a statement declaring that it would give up only if compelled by force. The government today declared its confidence in its ability to stamp out the revolt.

BARCELONA, Sept. 13.—A state of siege is proclaimed here and the Catalan military authorities have seized control. It is stated that several garrisons notably those in Madrid, Saragossa and Seville have adhered to the military movement.

The main telephone exchange here is occupied by men headed by Captain General Primo Rivera.

A proclamation to the people was issued by Rivera, criticizing the present government and stigmatizing the professional politicians for seizing power and annihilating the will of the king.

Owing to this situation, the proclamation states, the military authorities will take charge, though remaining loyal to the king.

OKLAHOMA KLAN IS FORCED TO YIELD TO GOVERNOR'S DEMAND

Organization Stripped of Masks and Executive Commands the Situation

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Sept. 13.—The "invisible empire" has laid aside its invisibility in Oklahoma submitting to the edict of Governor J. C. Walton against masked parades and meetings.

All members of the Ku Klux Klan in the state had orders from the grand dragon of the Oklahoma realm that robes and hoods must no longer be worn in public.

The unmasking of the Klan left Governor Walton in command of the field in his war on the secret organization, to which he attributes floggings and other mob outrages, but it was not without violent protest that state Klan officials decided to bow to his ultimatum.

A reward of \$1,000 for any person that can prove that Governor Walton ever signed an application for membership in the Ku Klux Klan has been offered by the governor. Klan officials made public what purported to be an application showing that the executive had been "obligated" in the Klan on February 13, last. Governor Walton denied that he had ever sought membership in the Klan and declared that he had refused to join the organization after being urged for more than a month.

W. S. HART HELD UP AND LOSES CLOSE TO \$4000

Owner of Local Theatre Visited By Robber While Counting Cash

W. S. Hart, one of the owners of the Pine Tree theatre here, was robbed of between \$3000 and \$4000 at his restaurant, Hart's Lunch, in Sacramento, Tuesday by an unmasked bandit. The police started search for the holdup man, who was fully described by Hart and restaurant employees, but have little hope of capturing him immediately. He is believed to have escaped in an automobile. The Sacramento Union gives details of the hold-up as follows:

Hart had just returned from the bank with the money, which represented Sunday and Monday's receipts and had been placed in a safety deposit vault preparatory to checking and depositing it, when the bandit walked into his office and carefully closed the door behind him. The money was in view on Hart's desk.

Bandit Asks For Job
The bandit started a conversation with Hart by asking for work. Hart became suspicious and referred him to the restaurant manager. An attempt by the holdup man to prolong the conversation caused Hart to start toward the door.

"Stick 'em up," commanded the bandit. "I guess I'll take a little of that money."

He pointed a small revolver at the restaurant man, keeping it almost concealed against his side and produced a small hand bag. The bandit forced Hart to "let the money" he was unable to reach into the bag, and then hastily swept the remainder into it.

Hart made an offer of \$100 and a promise not to report the robbery to police if the bandit would leave half the money.

"I get it all," the bandit responded.

Robber Shows Cool Nerve
Just as the bandit ceased speaking the door opened and a laundryman entered to collect a bill. The bandit, in a low voice, warned Hart not to give an alarm. Hart stepped toward the bandit, but was warned back by a slight motion of the bandit's revolver. Hart then told the laundryman to come back the next day for his money. The laundryman left without his suspicions being aroused.

Fred Roller, proprietor of a crackery house on K street, and a friend of Hart, entered the office just as the bandit was preparing to leave. Hart was again warned to remain silent.

While Roller glanced over the headlines of a newspaper, the bandit closed his small grip, and motioned Hart to accompany him to the door. He again warned Hart against making any outcry and quickly fled through the office door, and out the rear of the restaurant into the alley between L and K streets. Police believe he had a car parked on L street.

Familiar With Restaurant
According to employees of the restaurant, the bandit had sat at a table in the rear, near Hart's office, for about half an hour, evidently waiting Hart's return from the bank. This display of knowledge by the bandit of Hart's movements, and his familiarity with the premises convinced police that he had carefully planned the holdup.

The bandit was described by Hart and several employees as 28 years old, medium built and about 5 feet nine inches tall. He wore blue bib overalls.

PORTLAND GETS RADIO SET

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 13.—Portland is now equipped with long range commercial radio facilities through the establishment of receiving and sending stations by the Federal Telegraph company. A new marine radio station was put in operation here by the company at Council Crest, the highest point in the city. This is used for receiving. A sending station has been in operation for some time at Hillsboro, a suburb.

KU KLUX KLAN IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 13.—The Ku Klux Klan has appeared in Mexico, but thus far has confined its activities to visits to newspaper offices and to writing communications to the press. The Klanmen wear black robes and hoods and are chary with words, emphasizing their arguments with pistol flourishes. Their only entrance into public affairs has been a clean-up campaign conducted at Tacubaya, a suburb.

COURT NOT CONVINCED THAT WOOD ALCOHOL IS GOOD FOR TEETH

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 13.—Wood alcohol makes a good tooth paste and mouth wash, with the single disadvantage that it gets one into jail occasionally, the justice court here learned recently from James Wilton, during his trial on a drunkenness charge.

Authorities from Elliyard informed the local court that Wilton's "mouth wash" had gotten him into jail there a few times before his trouble here. Sheriff McEwen, who made the arrest, testified that Wilton had drunk a full half pint of undiluted wood alcohol.

TWO MORE BOLT STATE PRISON

One Recaptured But Other Eludes Pursuit; Escaped In Sawdust Load

SALEM, Sept. 13.—Ellsworth Kelley and George Jackson, convicts detailed for hauling sawdust from the prison sawmill to the state fair grounds, escaped yesterday.

Kelly, armed with a large pocket knife was still at large last night. The men concealed themselves in a load of sawdust, and were not discovered until the load was dumped at the fair grounds. Both made a break for liberty, but Jackson was captured after running for a short distance.

PROBING RUMORS

Methodists Name Committee To Investigate Local State Dry Agent

PORTLAND, Sept. 13.—Oregon Methodists, opening their conference here yesterday, elected Rev. J. C. Spencer, Albany secretary, Rev. Simpson Hanrick, Tillamook, treasurer, and Rev. Frank James Dallas, statistician. Bishop Shepard is president.

A committee consisting of Rev. F. L. Moore of Klamath Falls; Rev. H. S. Pemberton of Salem; Rev. Gabriel Sykes of Hood River; Rev. Henry T. Atkinson of Portland and Rev. C. G. Morris of Brownsville were appointed today to investigate rumors concerning Rev. Fred W. Snyder of the Klamath Loggers mission. No charges have been filed against Snyder.

Snyder is better known in Klamath county as a prohibition agent than as a preacher. His appointment as state enforcement agent is said to have been revoked recently, together with that of J. J. Shaughnessy. Of what the matters might be that gave rise to the rumors the conference is investigating, there is no definite local knowledge available.

LABORER ARRESTED

Fraud in Securing Transportation Charged Against M. E. Moody

Fraud in securing transportation is charged against M. E. Moody by the Pelican Bay Lumber company, on whose complaint Moody was arrested yesterday. Moody is alleged to have had his fare here paid by the company with the understanding that he would work it out, and to have failed to keep his agreement after he reached here. He asked time to communicate with his father in Los Angeles before entering a plea, and Judge Emmitt granted the request.

TOKIO SPENDS FIRST QUIET NIGHT IN WEEK

Night Free From Quakes; Three Days for Cremation of Tokio Dead

TOKIO, Sept. 13.—The people of this city feel relieved after the first night free from earthquakes during a week of more than one thousand shocks.

The Yokohama situation is said to be appalling. Thousands are camped in the parks with but a scanty supply of food and water.

Three days were needed to cremate the bodies taken from the Sumida river, which runs through Tokio.

AMERICA EXCEEDS QUOTA OF RELIEF REQUESTED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—The five million dollars originally asked of the American people for Japanese earthquake sufferers was exceeded by more than a hundred thousand dollars as contributions continued to pour in from every section of the country, but Red Cross officials sent forth the word that continued support of the public was necessary.

A total of \$5,108,390 had been pledged when the books were closed for the day.

Three of the country's divisions to which the work of collecting money allotted exceeded their quotas on the first \$5,000,000. They were the Washington, Central and New England divisions. The Washington region reported \$5,014,000; the Central gathered \$501,000 with a quota of \$300,000; the New England showed returns of \$409,000 against \$350,000 asked.

Gifts By Divisions
Other contributions by divisions were: Southern \$26,000; Southwestern \$300,000; Pacific \$295,000; Inland and foreign \$201,500.

Of the amount subscribed \$3,768,500 has been utilized of which \$2,401,000 was expended for food, clothing, medicines and building materials. The remaining \$1,367,500 represents donations of actual money for use in Japan and the Philippine islands for the purchase of supplies. Of the latter sum \$1,000,000 was set aside today in response to the appeal of Ambassador Woods at Tokio to be placed at the disposal of the Japanese emergency relief bureau.

Nine Red Cross relief ships, carrying thousands of tons of clothing, building materials, foods, and other necessities, either have sailed or will sail within a few days from Pacific coast ports. The commodities making up these shipments account for expenditure of the \$2,401,000 and the commodities and expenditures involved include:

Relief Goods Shipped

Ten to twelve million pounds Pacific coast rice, \$500,000; medical and hospital supplies, \$46,000; authority to Seattle to purchase milk, canned fish and flour, \$385,000; authority to San Francisco to purchase milk, canned fish and flour, \$695,000; 200,000 suits of underwear, \$300,000; 300,000 pairs of stockings, \$50,000; authority to Portland to purchase 4,500,000 feet of timber, \$150,000; authority to Seattle to purchase timber, \$85,000, and one hundred thousand blankets, \$170,000.

Of the vessels which have sailed, the Tyndarus, Kongsan Maru and President Jackson cleared from Seattle and the President Taft and Somme from San Francisco. The Toya Maru is to sail from Seattle September 13; the Vega from San Francisco September 14; the West Henshaw from Seattle September 25, and the Dewey from Portland September 25.

President Coolidge expressed today to John Harton Payne, chairman of the Red Cross, his deep personal gratification at the response made by the American people to the appeal for relief funds.

Through the state department, Ambassador Hanihara transmitted expression of gratitude from Premier Yamamoto of Japan.
