A divorce complaint filed by William A. vs. Mary A. Terry alleges desertion. They were married October 7, 1894.

STORE IS SOLD

Two Medford Men and Local Resident in Partnership Buy Johnstone's Place

Purchase of the Johnstone furniture store by W. G. Morduff and Scott Wolf of Medford, and Claude Davis of this city has been announced. The deal was closed Tuesday, and the new owners will take over the business immediately. Wolf and Morduff have a large furniture store in Medford, and will return there in a short time, leaving the local store under the management of Davis.

Willis Johnstone, who has owned the store for several years, will settle his affairs here as speedily as possible, and leave for Alaska, where he has valuable mining properties.

Part of the furniture stock was not included in the transfer. This surplus will be put on sale by Johnstone in order to clean up his business here.

GERMAN EXILES MAY SETTLE IN WEST INDIAN ISLANDS

LONDON, Sept. 13.—The Dutch West Indies may become a place of refuge for exiled members of the German nobility. These colonies consist of the islands of the Curacao group, off the shores of Venezuela, and Dutch Guiana, on the north coast of South America. Representatives of such exiles have been looking for a suitable country where property might be purchased without undue criticism, and depleted capital laid out to advantage.

Already some purchases have been made, the most notable being that of the former reigning duke of Mecklenburg, who himself recently made a trip to the West Indies and purchased several large plantations. His action has been copied by many of the lesser nobles, and it is expected a colony of these exiles shortly will be settled on the islands.
