

CRATER LAKE SEASON ENDS; WAS BEST IN HISTORY OF PARK

Lodge Left In Hands Of Caretaker And Workmen Will Remain To Finish New Wing Interior

The most successful season in the history of Crater Lake ended Saturday when the lodge closed and all the employees and remaining guests departed.

The lodge will be left in the hands of a caretaker, who this winter will be John Mabin, former well-known employee of Crater National Park, and who was caretaker of the lodge two years ago. It is understood that a crew of the contractors will remain until the snow drives them out, to work on the interior of the new lodge wing, which was only placed under roof early last week and which will not be completed for occupancy until about the middle of next July.

Before the lodge staff left for Medford all the equipment was seen to be packed up to weather the long winter season, and stored in the lodge. The tent cottages were all taken down and packed away in the new lodge wing last week.

Superintendent Charles G. Thomson of Crater National Park with a crew of workmen plans to remain at the park until the middle of October unless driven out by deep snow sooner, to grade fill in and otherwise get the roads in the park in as good a condition as possible in that time. The park roads were badly worn by the heavy traffic during the season, which left them rutty and uneven in many places.

While the attendance figures for this past season will not be known exactly until after the closing, it is known that they will go far over 50,000, that number having been reached a week ago. Last year's attendance, which had broken the record of previous seasons by far was something over 33,000 persons.

METSKER APPEALS

Joe Smith was brought before Justice of the Peace Emmitt by R. C. Williams state traffic officer Monday morning and fined \$20, for exceeding the Klamath Falls speed limits.

Whether People Will Be Asked To Vote On Question At Special Election To Be Decided

Whether a proposal of an amendment to the city charter should be included in the measures to be voted on when the special election is held in this city Nov. 6, was considered final decision was put off till next Monday night. It will be necessary for final action to be taken soon in order that state authorities may be notified.

The pool room ordinance, which was referred to the police committee last meeting was laid over when the committee asked for additional time to make a report. Joe McDonald and Fred Garick, sponsors of the ordinance, were present at the meeting. They spoke on the necessity of making allowance for the car room proprietor, and recommended a tax of \$25 annually for them instead of \$100.

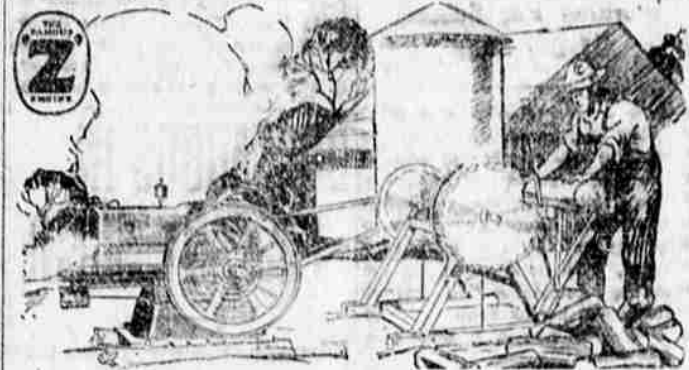
