DAVIS TALKS ON AIR DEFENSE

MARS is not a follower of Dr. Coue," declares Assistant Secretary of War Dwight Davis, who sounds a warning to the nation on the danger of permitting our air service to become impotent as a vital branch of national defense. "What are we, as a nation, doing to safeguard ourselves against these dangers that menace us?" asks Davis, after reviewing what is being done by European nations in developing tremendous engines of war for operation in the air. And he answers by declaring, "Alas, pitifully little. We have reduced our Army Air Service below the safety point for national defense until its actual strength today is only 915 officers and about 8,600 men. We have failed to provide even this meager force with adequate equipment for training, much less for combat needs."

Davis presents a few figures to show the number of planes needed solely for training and include new planes to be delivered each year, but do not include any planes for war reserve or for combat. In 1922, as a result of the large number of planes on hand after the armistice, we had a surplus of all types of 2,125 planes; in 1923, this surplus was reduced to 746; in 1924, we will have a shortage of planes, needed solely for training, of 265. In 1925, if the appropriations are not increased, our shortage will be 861, and in 1926, the shortage will be 1,428. "We are literally starving to death this vital branch of our national defense," declares Davis, but "even more serious than this is the fact that our airplane industry is also starving to death. The threatened extinction of the aeroplane industry is a national peril and must be averted. It is our national policy to use existing commercial facilities to the greatest possible extent, rather than to maintain large military establishments in time of peace. It is vital, therefore, that both the Government and private citizens do everything that can be legitimately done to encourage the development of the commercial aircraft industry in this country. An aircraft industry, established on a sound commercial basis, could, in time of emergency, be rapidly converted to the needs of national defense."

That other countries are thoroughly awake to the necessity of aircraft development is evidenced by the fact that Great Britain has an air service personnel of 31,000 officers and men, while her appropriations for aviation purposes last year amounted to about \$55,000,000. Recently she has provided for a considerable increase in air force and she is doing all she can to encourage commercial aerial transportation. France has the strongest force of any country. She has 1,400 planes in commission and twice as many in reserve, and her air service appropriations last year amounted to 247,000,000 lire to increase the air force and not less than 1,000 of the most modern airplanes will be in commission soon.

Who does not remember the ghastly situation which arose when we entered the war and when we were promised 20,000 planes at the front by July, 1918? Not one showed up. To meet its requirements for a war program today the War Department would need 11 months for training planes, 9 months for observation, 17 months for attack, 17 months for bombing, and 18 months for pursuit planes. The American Legion has petitioned for an international conference to limit airplane construction. This, of course, would be applicable only to military planes. Should the conference be called, and should it accomplish its purpose, we would still be obligated by every consideration of national safety to develop a commercial aircraft industry.

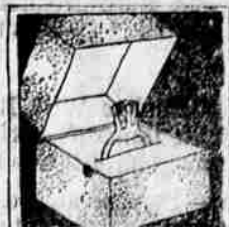
