As the season progresses new material may come to light that will put Redlands in the running for the Southern California conference championship, but present indications point to a lean year.

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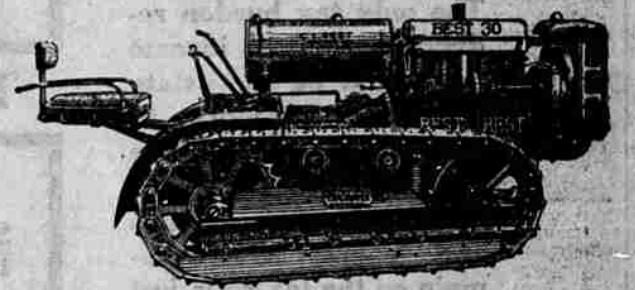
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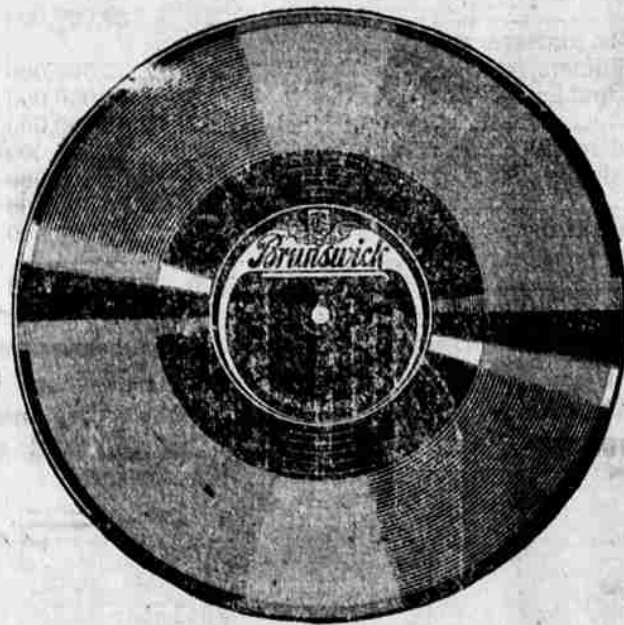
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
