FIERY LEADER FINDS REFUGE

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Stephen Raditch, the stormy petrel of Yugoslavia, is now in London. The irrepressible Croatian patriot, who has been compared to Patrick Henry, Kossuth, d'Annunzio and De Valera, fled across six European borders, unrecognized and found refuge in the British capital. The Belgrade authorities had accused him of high treason for defying the government and comparing the country's young queen, Marie, to Madame de Pompadour for her extravagance.

Raditch was formerly a bookseller in Zagreb, Croatia. He is gifted with great eloquence, and all the independent spirit and fiery temper of the true patriot. He began his bloodless fight for home rule against the Serbs in 1918, after Croatia had become merged with the new kingdom of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes. Like the sons of Ireland who fought to achieve the independence of their country, Raditch from that time never ceased the struggle for the freedom of his countrymen. He was a constant thorn in the side of the Belgrade government, which both feared and respected him. After warning him many times against his radical utterances, the cabinet had him arrested, but soon ordered his release when his supporters threatened a revolution.

Raditch is sometimes described as the Mystery Man of Europe, and

he has always been an enigma even to the Serbs, who variously call him charlatan, scoundrel and lunatic. But none of these epithets is regarded by outsiders as just, for the Croatian leader had behind him the whole of his little nation. He is small in stature and unimpressive in appearance, but possesses striking intellectual talents, much charm of manner, and many ideas which tumble over each other in their haste to find expression.

PUGILIST SUSPENDED

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 12.—Mickey Walker, world's welterweight champion, and Jack Bulger, his manager, were suspended for one year by the New Jersey boxing commission as a result of Walker's miserable showing in his fight last night at Newark, with Jimmy Jones, Youngstown, Ohio, challenger.

Jones was not suspended. Neither man will get any money above training expenses. Comptroller Newton A. Bugbee, chairman of the boxing committee, characterized the bout as an "awful fake."

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 11.—Occidental college, runner-up for the Southern California Conference football championship, last fall, will start the 1923 season with the brightest prospects in years. Its friends assert. Besides several hold-over varsity players Coach Joseph "Timber Wolf" Pipal will have a host of performers from last year's strong freshman squad.

Captain Spangler and Cliff Argus, sprinter, will be back and probably again will hold down end positions. Both are heavier than

they were last fall. Percell and Johnson, substitute wingmen of last year, also will try for berths on the varsity.

Snoddy and Stevens already appear to have the best chances to be the tackles. Snoddy, a 260-pounder was a member of the 1921 freshman team, but was not in school last season. He is expected to be a tower of strength. Stevens is a 180-pounder from Santa Ana, Cal., and is said to be a natural player. Westgate, who played tackle on the varsity last season, probably will be in the backfield in coming games.

For guards Pipal has Croighton, Goodenough and Davidson from the 1922 varsity and Chandler from the freshmen. Art Gary, formerly a

tailback, may also be used in guard because of his size and strength. Percy Renius, center of the 1921 varsity, may return to school and if so will try to obtain his old position away from Praults, last season's pivot man.

The three leading candidates for quarterback are Gordon Shoaf, who called signals part of the time last year; Poshay Smith, of the freshmen, and "Dempsey" Creswell, last year's substitute.

To "Tarzan" Ridderhoff, who showed up for practice weighing a trifle over 200 pounds, is generally conceded the fullback job. He is one of the best line plunging backs in Southern California and a hard man to stop.
