WRESTLERS TO MEET AT PINE TREE TONIGHT

The middleweight championship of Oregon is the prize for the winner of tonight's wrestling bout at the Pine Tree theatre between Henry Burke, of Omaha, and Gus Schultze of Lakeview.

Joseph White, manager for Burke, admits that his grappler has a job cut out for him for the Lake county wrestler is a tough man to handle.

Many Sportsmen Out For Opening of Season Yesterday! Birds Plentiful

The season for quail opened yesterday morning a half hour before sunrise, and will last two weeks, until Sunday, October 28. Many local sportsmen forsake the quick and the goose for the smaller game bird.

The quail in this country are of two varieties, the Bobwhite and the mountain quail. The Bobwhite roams the lowlands and plains while the mountain quail, a slightly smaller bird, may be seen in the foothills close to the pine forests.

There are thousands of quail in Klamath county. They are most plentiful in the central and southern parts; particularly southeast of here. While the limit is but five per day, still the hunter is amply repaid for his efforts by the keen sport of outwitting the wise little bird.

LAW TO LIMIT COURTHOUSES

Statute Framed by Klamath Representative Defines Procedure Strictly

Aimed to prevent another courthouse situation in Oregon, similar to that which gave rise to years of litigation in Klamath county, a law was passed by the last legislature, at the instance of the Klamath county representative, James Ezell, which provides definitely for the procedure to be followed by the county court in constructing new courthouses, and in providing funds to pay for them.

Under this law the county court may start proceedings at any time, but the will of the people must first be determined and the county court is prevented from taking any action without first holding a public meeting and obtaining such expressions as the residents of the county may care to make.

The new law provides that whenever the county court deems it advisable to build a new county court house, they may make a levy or in some other lawful manner take the necessary steps to provide funds for the purpose, but they must first give sixty days' notice. An order for the giving of such notice must be made at a regular

meeting of the court and placed on record. The notice shall clearly specify, the law provides, the site upon which it is proposed to build the new court house, the approximate cost, and the approximate date upon which it is proposed to commence construction, and the date upon which a public hearing will be had. The court is also required to publish in order once a week for four weeks in some newspaper in the county, and to post notices where there are no newspapers of general circulation.

A meeting must be held not less than ten nor more than thirty days before the date the proposed levy is to be made, and at that meeting petitions may be presented, asking that the matter be referred to a vote of the people. Petitions for other sites may also be submitted. These petitions must be signed by not less than two per cent of the qualified voters as shown by the last vote for governor.

Upon presentation of such petitions the county court must submit the question, if the signatures are found to be genuine and the petitions in proper form, and with in ten days must adopt an order for a special election.

The law provides that the court must follow this procedure in planning for a court house and is prevented from making any levy or taking any steps to provide funds without following this procedure.

The law does not permit court houses to be built outside of the county seat and does not apply in any manner to the making of repairs or additions to existing buildings, or the construction of jails, vaults, or additional offices.
