NOT A SPARK OF SYMPATHY

(From the Oregon Voter)

REPEATED, reiterated and corroborated declarations that Governor Pierce's promises of place have been broken are being freely circulated by the men to whom the governor is alleged to have made the promises. According to these men the governor is entirely undependable in fulfillment of promises as to appointments. To the type of mind which honors a political promise as sacred above all other considerations, this faithlessness on the governor's part constitutes what is akin to a high crime and misdemeanor such as merits instant removal from office.

"Hell knows no fury like a woman scorned," unless it is the politician who figured on fulfillment of a promise of a job for himself or a political dependent and who wakes up to find that the job was given to another in violation of a direct personal promise. As we figure it, this fury is mainly responsible for initiating the recall movement. Secondly responsible is the disappointment of irrigation investors over the governor's irrigation policy, a disappointment intensified by the sanguine assurances given by the governor to the settlers on particular projects that he would take care of their interest, assurances which have failed so far of fulfillment.

In our opinion, Governor Pierce has labored under the false impression that he was so carefully qualifying each of his promises that it really meant nothing but an effort to please whomsoever he happened to be talking to at the time. Very likely he made "mental reservations" as to the literalness with which his soothing assurances might be construed. But those whose place power and promotion are at stake are naturally unable to take this charitable view. Among them are a large number of Candidate Pierce's most active supporters.

They are not entitled to a spark of sympathy, for they were and are actuated by purely selfish motives. They were willing to tear down a safe and sane administration of state affairs for the sake of putting a reckless promiser in office. They knew very well what recklessness of utterance was ingrained and habitual with Candidate Pierce, but they supported him hoping that he would be their creature. He could not be all things to all whom his wild promises had misled, so those who were misled have now turned against him.

Like the heathen, they rage, and the recall is their handy instrument of revenge. Reckless of utterance as Mr. Pierce is and always has been, weak in fiber as he is and always has been, lacking in administrative competence as he is and always has been, he was nevertheless elected governor mainly through the efforts of those who were well acquainted with all of these shortcomings and weaknesses. Now these same people would drag the dignity and good name of the state further through the mire simply to get out of office the man who they feel is traitor to their selfish interest although in electing him in the first place they knew he was temperamentally incapable of accurate statement on any subject. Will the voters of Oregon suffer themselves to be further misled by these selfish and disappointed job-mongers?

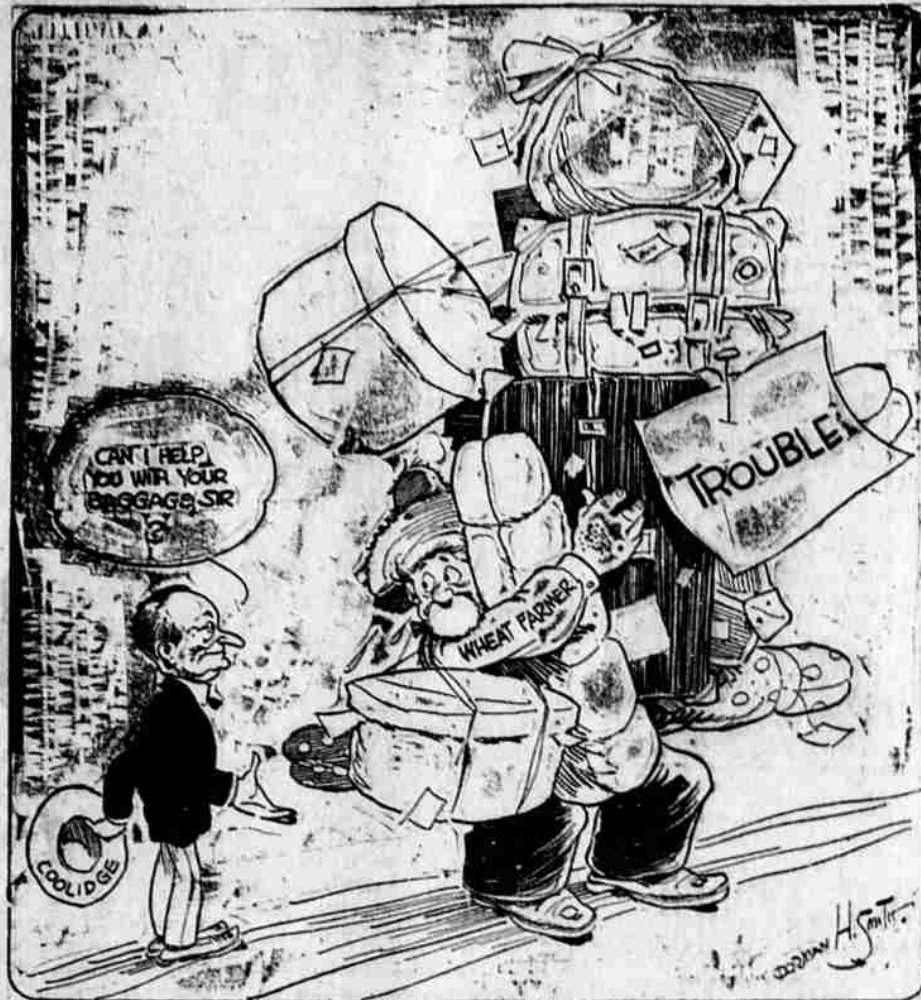
ANNIVERSARY OF JOHN BROWN'S RAID

TEACH HYGIENE BY COMPARISON

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 15.—Los Angeles school children are to be taught hygiene by strategy instead of being lectured on the subject, according to G. L. Glenn, director of physical education, and Miss Alma Dobbs, supervisor of hygiene.

"Lecturing children makes no impression upon them," Miss Dobbs said. "So we are trying another method of conforming to the state law on the subject in cooperation with the drawing, music, nature study and other departments."

"For instance we are interested this month in training each child to drink two glasses of milk each day. So the drawing classes emphasize facts about milk by making pictures of cows and milk wagons, or of little Miss Muffet eating her curds and whey."

"The first grade children are cutting out pictures of baby things—kittens and puppies—that drink milk, and dramatizing little stories they invent about milk. Nature study classes are investigating the habits of the goat. The children are keeping charts, in the form of cut out bottles, of the amount of milk they drink each day."

"Next month another health topic will be treated in the same way."
