

BILLIONS WILL BE INVOLVED IN NEW CASES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—The Court of Claims has reconvened with a calendar of cases for the winter term which, in the aggregate amount claimed and the novelty and importance of the issues involved exceed any cases that heretofore have been pending against the government at any one time. The amount involved in the cases now pending is approximately \$2,500,000,000, mostly arising out of the world war.

Claims filed against all departments of the government, among which are a large number that never have reached the court, include the following: the War Department, in which claimants have filed claims involving approximately \$5,000,000,000; the Bureau of Internal Revenue, which has before it claims for rebates and refunds aggregating many millions; the Shipping Board, where the amount of cancellations alone amounted to over \$550,000,000; is constructed, and if successful he

claims for patent infringement estimated by the Department of Justice at \$500,000,000; claims made by the railroads which as filed with the Railroad Administration amount to approximately \$2,250,000,000; claims proportionately large arise from the Housing Corporation, War Risk Bureau, Food and Fuel Administration, and there are also a large number of claims of a miscellaneous character.

The variety of the claims is almost unlimited. They include actions for requisitioning of ships and railroads, transportation of troops, ammunition and supplies, infringement of patents for high explosives, submarine boats and torpedoes, wireless and radio apparatus; contracts for anti-aircraft engines and guns, military and naval supplies and ammunition, appropriation of camp sites and naval bases, together with contracts for manufacturing and acts of commandeering of almost endless diversity.

Many novel and interesting questions are raised in the court, especially in suits for infringement of patents. The petition of one inventor claims \$1,000,000 for the little pocket books of stamps which are sold at every post office. Another claims that as early as 1905 he invented a sliding machine involving the principles upon which every airplane operated by the government is constructed, and if successful he

may recover \$10,000,000. The sum of \$995,000 is asked for infringement in the manufacture of torpedoes, and about \$30,000,000 for radio apparatus.

One test case is brought by a savings bank to determine the liability of the government for stolen government bonds and coupons, and if successful will result in other suits which, it is estimated, will swell the government's liability to \$150,000,000.

Claims are made for injuries to person and property by mail trucks and reimbursement is claimed by farmers for destruction of lands and crops by alighting mail planes. Owners of intoxicating liquors whose supplies have been confiscated by prohibition enforcement agents seek indemnity in money damages.

In preparation for the disposition of such a tremendous accession of new business the Court of Claims has so cleared its docket that not only pending suits, but actions based upon these war

claims, are receiving immediate attention. All cases are disposed of as rapidly as they are prepared and presented by counsel.

HAY FEVER, ASTHMA CURE IS PROMISED

CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—A million Americans who wheeze and sneeze with asthma and hay fever are promised relief and permanent cure in a new method of treatment, being considered at the convention of the American College of Surgeons.

Asthma and hay fever are due

to local infection, the new method claims. Infection at the root of teeth, in the nose, or in an internal organ may be responsible for the sneezing and gasping that annually sends thousands to various climates seeking relief.

"It has been found that those pus infections localized in some part of the body, may cause either asthma or hay fever," said Dr. Paul Hohl of Toledo.

"If they affect the bronchial tubes, we have asthma; if they affect the nose, we have hay fever."

Medicinal treatment or operation removes the cause of the trouble, surgeons stated. Up to this time, protein vaccines have been em-

ployed. Vaccines were made of proteins contained in foods or air-carried particles which excited the maladies.

Flower, grass, grain pollens, horse, dog and cat fur, tobacco smoke, face powder and eggs, have been the common exciting agents.

The surgeons forecast there will be less feeling before the pollen-bearing winds, less avoidance of eggs at the breakfast table. Patients who have not stroked a dog or cat for years, may in future surround themselves with household pets, if the new method and its promises hold good.

INCREASED USE OF COTTON REPORTED BY FEDERATION

MANCHESTER, Oct. 26.—The International Cotton Federation reports that of last year's cotton crops 22,026,000 bales were used, compared with 21,162,000 bales of the crops on the previous year.

During the latter half of last year the consumption of American cotton declined, this being due to the bad trade in Europe during the year. Egyptian was the only variety of which the consumption increased.
