Bly Stockman in Town

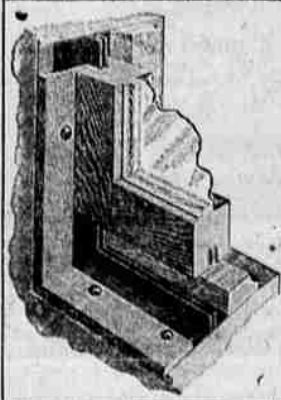
A. S. Conner, a well-known stockman whose ranch is in the vicinity of Bly, was a week-end visitor at the county seat.

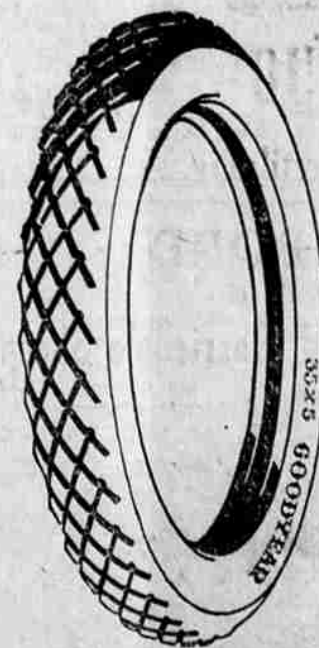
