

SENTIMENT FOR CO-OPERATIVE MARKET PLAN

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 29.—There is a decidedly favorable sentiment in agricultural communities of Oregon which warrant a thorough trial of the co-operative marketing plan, according to Alfred Lomax, professor of foreign trade at the University of Oregon, who delivered a radio lecture in Portland Friday on "An International Granary."

Professor Lomax said that there were three outstanding methods employed to market the wheat crop of the Northwest. First, the farmer may sell to whomsoever he chooses. Second, he may contract with large grain buying companies which operate export departments. Third he may employ co-operative marketing methods.

"Emphasis has been given to co-operative marketing through the committee appointed by President Coolidge to investigate wheat conditions in the Pacific Northwest," said Professor Lomax. "This together with crop diversification is something that should be discussed seriously and acted upon by Oregon farmers as a possible solution of their problems."

Discussing the opportunities for the creation of foreign markets for Oregon wheat, Lomax pointed to Japan as an interesting example of a consumer which each year increases its purchases.

"It is not so long ago that Japan was considered not much of a buyer of wheat, taking only 3,000,000 bushels," continued the speaker. "Fairly recent statistics reveal that in 1921 Japan imported 35,000,000 bushels of wheat from Portland, or more than the amount consumed in the entire Pacific Northwest. Japan has a population of 76,000,000. As the island empire progresses toward industrialism an increasing consumption of wheat from this section can be expected."

"Although Pacific coast wheat will have to enter into competition with trans-Pacific sources of production of this grain, the fact remains that Japan will always consider the North Pacific states a permanent place to come when filling orders for this cereal. It is interesting to note that Japan took 15 percent of the wheat exports from Portland last year."

Professor Lomax said that the ports of Portland and Astoria were the outlet for a great hinterland. It is estimated, he said, that the average annual production of wheat in this territory is between 60,000,000 and 80,000,000 bushels.
