Intelligence Tests

To Boys Hold True

EVANSTON, Ill., Nov. 1.—Standard and intelligence tests given 3½ years ago to 111 boys under 15 years of age, employed by one of the largest American industries, and who were re-examined in another year, evidence the fact that boys making high scores are more likely than others to become permanent employees.

These are the conclusions of Walter Dill Scott, president of Northwestern university, and Robert C. Clothier, Haverford school for boys, who conducted the experiment. Each

boy was tested and the charts filed away, and no attention was paid to them as each boy went his way, succeeding or failing according to the merit of his work. Then the new scores made possible a comparison

of the progress made by the boys during the intervening time. The average score of all the tests was 38.7; the average score of the 63 boys, then remaining in the company's service was 41.6 and the av-

erage score of the 48 boys who had left the company's service was 35.1, the report showed. "We have evidence that the boys making higher scores are more likely to remain with the company, and

this point becomes more impressive when we recognize that the boys who left the employ of the company did so for none of three definite reasons: some to obtain better positions; others to return to school, while still others were discharged.

The average score by the mental alertness tests of those who since obtained better positions was 44.7, while the average mental alertness test score of the boys who were discharged was 38.1."
