INSURANCE PAID TO BRUMFIELD'S WIDOW

Notation is Made in List of Oregon Politics Issued in 1922; Amount Was \$20,000.

ROSEBURG, Nov. 1.—In the list of insurance policies paid in Oregon during 1922, compiled and published by the Insurance News, appears the name of Dr. Richard Melvin Brumfield.

The notation gives the amount paid to the beneficiary, Mrs. R. Melvin Brumfield, as \$20,000. Dr. Brumfield committed suicide in the state penitentiary a few days before he was to have been hanged for the murder of Dennis Russell. His suicide came just after the year had expired in which it would have been impossible for his widow to recover from the insurance company on a case of suicide.

It will be remembered that Brumfield's last request of his widow was that she take the boys and "gypsy" through the country. Word has been received here that since Mrs. Brumfield's marriage to Howard Mozena, she has placed one of the boys in an eastern orphanage. The boy has since been "farmed out" to a family, who have signified their intention of adopting him. It is not known what became of the other two lads. It is reported that Mrs. Mozena is now residing in St. Louis.
