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WOLVES BECOME SERIOUS MENACE IN PARTS OF MISSOURI

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Wolves are more of a menace in many sections of Missouri this year than they have been within the last 40 years and the state and federal governments have combined to exterminate them.
So troublesome have they become to livestock and poultry that a special appropriation of \$15,000 for fighting them was made by the state. The biological survey of the Department of Agriculture is cooperating and bearing part of the expense of wolf trappers. The government has sent an inspector to select trappers, plan and direct their work, and to receive requests from counties needing assistance.
"Missouri wolf No. 1" was killed near Rolla, Phelps county, early in September, and since then wolves have been trapped in other counties.
