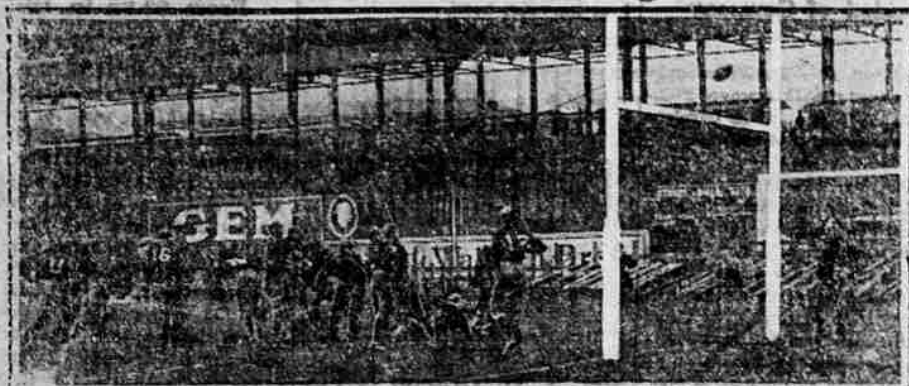

COCKROACH CONTROL

Cockroaches may be controlled by the use of sodium chloride mixed with equal parts of some carrier. George Wilson, Washington's left half, pushed through the California line as if it were paper. He, aided by Tesreau, brought the ball in a few plays to within ten yards of the Bears' goal line. Here a forward pass failed and the ball went to California on the Huskies' 20-yard line.

The Washington machine, powerful on line defense, failed to display the offensive strength which its supporters had expected. And in the open field, Washington showed itself inferior to the Bear at tackling. On several costly occasions Washington tacklers missed and the results were long runs.

California on the other hand was dazzling in its offensive. Nichols, the Bears' greatest star, proved himself too quick and shifty for the Washington men. Time and time again Captain Dixon ran back punts for long distances, tore around end for substantial gains and found holes in the line Jimmy Dixon, another speedy California back, made long and rumb.

WASHINGTON STATE HAS EDGE IN GAME

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 19.—Playing in a neutral theater, Tacoma's scenic stadium, Washington State college and Oregon Agricultural college each scored three points Saturday in their 15th football battle. All the counting was in the first period. The crowd of 12,000 plainly indicated its feeling that Washington State better deserved the laurels of victory than the Oregon Aggies.

Governor Louis F. Hart of Washington, in a seat of honor, was one of the crowd which frequently thrilled at chances that never materialized. Governor Walter M. Pierce of Oregon was invited but did not appear.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 19.—Newspaper photographs of the Zev-In Memoriam match at Churchill Downs Saturday show the heads of the two horses are on a practically dead level with In Memoriam having a fraction the better of it if anything. Closest Finish in Racing History.

FRUIT EXPRESS PLACES ORDERS FOR MORE CARS

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17.—Orders for the building of 3057 new refrigerator cars for delivery prior to the peak of the 1924 season are being placed by the Pacific Fruit Express Company. It was announced today by C. M. Secrist, Vice-President and General manager of the company. It is estimated the cost of the new cars will be about \$10,000,000.

On November 1 there remained to be delivered on orders for this year a total of 875 refrigerators which, added to the purchase just authorized, will make available next season 3732 more cars than were in service this season or an increase of about 14 per cent.

The cars now being ordered will increase the total equipment owned by the Pacific Fruit Express Company to more than 30,500 refrigerator cars.

In addition to the orders mentioned, on November 1 there remained to be delivered 215 refrigerator cars designed for passenger train service on a previous order for 300 such cars. All of these should be delivered within the next two or three months and be available for early spring traffic.

These cars are used exclusively for moving to market fruit and vegetable business originating in those sections of California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Colorado, Arizona, Texas and Louisiana served by the Pacific Fruit Express.

FALL DISKING OF STUBBLE CAUSES YIELD DECREASE

(O. H. C. Bulletin)
Larger yields of wheat are obtained by early spring plowing at the Moro experiment station and at the Lind, Wash., station as reported in federal bulletin 1173. Fall disking of stubble land decreases yields on lands plowed early in the spring.

Deep plowing experiments show a slight increase in yield in some cases over that obtained on average plowing.

Surface and subsurface packing of the soil after plowing shows slight increase in yield in a few cases on early spring plowed land, while a decrease in yield was obtained from the late plowed lands.

Frequent cultivation of the summer fallow at the Moro station resulted in higher average yields on land plowed in the fall or land plowed during May, than on no cultivation or one harrowing only.

Spring harrowing of winter wheat reduced the yield in most cases.

Planting winter wheat the middle of September or early October gave slightly higher average yields than wheat sown later. Wheat sown as late as November 1 gave reduced yield.

Depth of planting experiments at the Moro station resulted in

equal yields on all plots. Depth of planting showed an important influence on stand, especially in late planting. At the Lind, Wash., station shallow seeding of winter wheat and spring wheat sown four inches deep gave the best yields.
