

THE HARRISONS TO MAKE FIRST APPEARANCE HERE NEXT SUNDAY

Next Sunday morning at 11 o'clock will be the first appearance in Klamath Falls of "the Harrisons" whose coming is being eagerly anticipated by those interested in the Bible and its application to the affairs of everyday life.

The Rev. Norman B. Harrison was for ten years pastor of the University Presbyterian church of Seattle, during which time the church added 700 new members, sent 11 mission-

Mr. Harrison bases his study for the first week on the book of Romans, continuing through the week each evening at 7:30 except Saturday, and uses for the last four studies of the second week the book of Philippians. The series closes on December 7.

A general invitation to the public has been issued by the local Presbyterian church, Sixth and Pine streets, under whose auspices the Harrisons are visiting this city.

SUNFLOWER SEED CROP IS VALUED AT \$250,000

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—Sunflower seeds, 14,000,000 pounds of them, worth almost three-quarters of a million dollars. That is this year's crop of the three important producing states, Missouri, Illinois and California, according to the Department of Agriculture.

The yield this year is about 4,000,000 pounds more than last year. From four to six million pounds are imported annually, principally from Holland, Argentina and Russia.

"The poor man's peanuts" are what sunflower seeds are called in some sections. In New York City many Russians buy and roast them to eat. They are used principally, though, in poultry feed mixtures and for parrot feed.

Kansas, the "Sunflower State," produces practically no sunflower seeds for commercial use but in the three principal producing states they are considered a profitable crop as about 600 pounds per acre can be produced and sold around \$4 per 100 pounds.

FRANCE FINDS FEW STARS FOR SHORT DISTANCE

PARIS, Nov. 23.—The French outdoor 1923 athletic season has just closed, and in the absence of startling performances the newcomers coupled with the necessity of relying upon Antwerp veterans, the outlook for a French Olympic victory in the 100 and 200 metres distances next year is acknowledged by the French Olympic Committee and leaders of the French Athletic Federation as very gloomy. Andre Mourlon, with a mark of 10 4-5 seconds, will be lucky to reach the finals, they declare.

Verquin of Tourcoing and Hirshmann of Strasbourg are the most promising youngsters developed this year, but neither of them has bettered 11 seconds. The former belongs to a football club which plays association football league games each week, which is regarded as likely to take the edge off his form. His 11mman is a mere strapping and cannot stand hard training.

Cerbonney, Dergelle and Cailleteau, all youngsters, will carry the French hopes in the 200. Cerbonney recently equalled the French record of 22 1-5 seconds for the distance and set a mark of 35 1-5 for the 300; but these times will not win at Colombes. The French realizing this, are bending every effort to train men for the longer distances, 5,000, 10,000 and the Marathon, in which they hope to make a better showing.

DUKE, 78 AND HARD UP, WOULD DISPOSE OF HIS TREASURES

VIENNA, Nov. 23.—Duke Ernst August of Cumberland, 78 and hard up, is said to be negotiating with Paris jewelers for the sale to an American of treasures of the Guelphs. These he brought to Austria when he was forced to leave Hannover, over which principally he ruled until it was absorbed by Prussia after the Austro-Prussian war in 1866. The price mentioned is \$30,000,000.

Austria has objected to the exportation of the art objects, but the duke has replied that they were never in public museums, that Austria has no claim on them and that the country will lose the 55 percent export tax if it interferes. He claims the right to dispose of them as he pleases.

The duke's son, the Duke of Brunswick, married the only daughter of the former kaiser in 1912. The duke's willingness to sell the Hannover plate is regarded as an indication that he has abandoned all hope of having his family restored to power in Hannover.

WHALEERS ACTIVE IN ANTARCTIC

CHRISTIANIA, Nov. 23.—The whaling industry has come back in Norway, and it now holds an important position in the economic life of the country. Last year the operations in the Antarctic brought in 50,000,000 crowns. Sixty-six whaling vessels are in commission, and 3,000 persons are engaged in the business.

SAYS RED-HAIRED PERSONS MAKE THE BEST CONQUERERS

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 23.—Red-haired persons make the best explorers and conquerors, contends Herbert E. Bolton, professor of American history at the University of California. He credits them with great initiative and persevering ambition.

The professor cites in support of his theory Columbus, Pedro de Alvarado, the most noted of Cortes' assistants, and O'Connor, prominent in the expansion of the American southwest, all were graced with red hair.

Professor Bolton recalls that recently a tribe of cannibals in the South Sea Islands killed all but one of a group of explorers. The one man spared had red hair, which the primitive mind took for a symbol of extraordinary power. The savages, moved by some tribal taboo, feared him.

The reader is reminded also that a short time ago a San Francisco firm advertised for red-haired salesmen only.

A bamboo organ in the Catholic church of Los Pinos, near Manila, Philippine islands, was built about 1818 by a Spanish priest, who used more than 900 lengths of bamboo in the construction. Every part is of bamboo and the organ is still used every week by the Belgian priest in charge.

STORK DISLIKES MEATLESS DAYS AT GERMAN ZOO

LEIPZIG, Nov. 23.—Oatmeal as a substitute for meat for the carnivorous animals of the Leipzig zoo has been tried out with interesting but not particularly successful results. Meatless days reached the zoo here some months ago, because of the high prices, the principal outcome of the experiment being, it has been noted, a decided falling off in the visit of the stork.

The lions and tigers and wolves became thin and ill tempered, and howled a great deal at night and howled again in the morning, right after breakfast when oatmeal day after day was dished out to them. Furthermore, the fur of the animals, according to the zoo authorities, has failed to thicken up on the vegetarian diet, as it should in the fall to form the animals' winter covering, and the pelts of most of them are so thin that the caretakers say they are trying to conceive some form of blankets or overcoats for their pets to keep out the chilliness of January and February. Only one little lion has appeared since oatmeal was put on the menu regularly in the place of meat.

The bear, says the zoo superintendent, has not minded the oatmeal diet quite so much as some of the others of their neighbors. When the feeding of meat was suspended the bears faded away, and lost most of their playful manners much to the regret of the regular Sunday assembling of Leipzig children, but nevertheless every now and then a new little bear, or twins, appeared within the bear enclosures. GERMANS FAIL IN EFFORT TO BUY WARSHIPS

HAMBURG, Nov. 23.—America's decision not to sell any cast-off warships to foreign buyers on the ground that such action would minimize war, has attracted much attention in Europe. Several German firms made inquiries in Washington concerning battleships which were to be scrapped, as the vessels were desired by them for the iron
