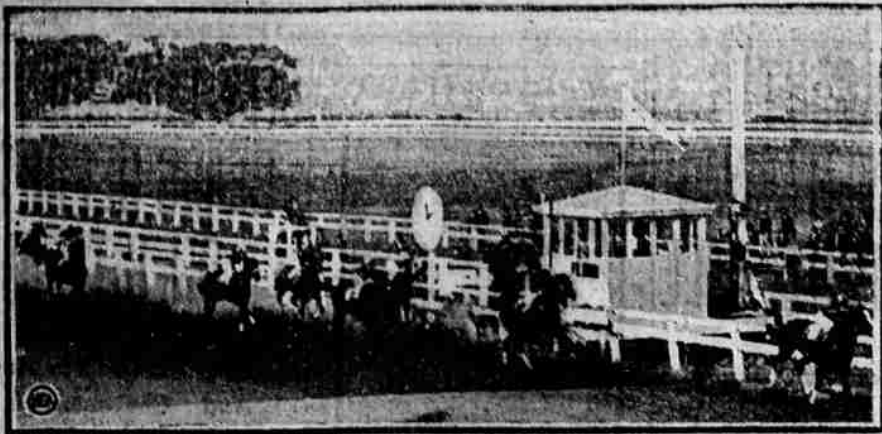

Getting off to a bad start due, apparently, more to lack of confidence than absence of gridiron ability, Klamath found herself in the recent game with Grants Pass, and now the boys are ready to tackle all comers. Klamath may have her hands full, but Redding will not have a walkaway. Not this time.

There will be a big rally at the high school Wednesday night for all students. The alumni is invited to attend and lend a hand for old Klamath, and also to attend the game and boost for their home-town team. This is Klamath's popular yell:

REINHART COACH OF BASKETBALL

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 27.—William Reinhart, who, since the opening of the University of Oregon this fall has held the position of backfield coach for the freshman football squad, has been appointed basketball coach for the varsity hoop team.

Reinhart was selected from the field of applicants by the executive council for the Associated Students after being recommended by Virgil Earl, director of athletics at the University. Earl's recommendation was the outcome of an expressed desire on the part of the basketball lettermen that Reinhart should be mentor of the varsity hoop sport.

The record established by Reinhart as an Oregon athlete seems to give him a clear call to the position, as well as the fact that he was a student of the basketball system advocated by Bohler, basketball coach of last year. This will be greatly in Reinhart's favor as he has a team that is well scheduled in the Bohler methods, which placed a premium on fast passing and team play. As it stands now, Coach Reinhart will be able to start his work with a group of men that are well versed in the system with which he is familiar, whereas, if a coach of another type were appointed he would have to undo the system of basketball known to Reinhart and his players.

Oregon's prospects for basketball look exceedingly bright this year. Very few of last year's players were lost through graduation and Coach Reinhart will start practice next Monday with seven lettermen of previous years in the squad. Lettermen who will turn out for practice Monday are Latham, center; Alstock, forward; Cowans, forward; Rockney, forward; Shafer, guard; Chapman, guard; Edlunds, forward. Beside these men the new coach will have some exceptionally good material from last year's freshman team to draw upon.

OLD STYLE OF BALL USED IN UNIQUE MATCH

LONDON, Nov. 27.—Nearly all of Britain's most famous amateur golfers went down to Working the other day to test their skill with the old gutta ball which disappeared from the tees 21 years ago upon the invention in America of the rubber-core ball.

A competition was held between the "Hasbeens," and the "Neverwasers," those of the grey-haired school who had learned the game with the solid old gutta, and the younger men who took up golf after the appearance of the more resilient ball. It ended all square.

Curiously enough the day proved a triumph for youth and genius, rather than for experience. Roger Wethered, the 25-year-old amateur champion, played as well with the gutta, a new thing in his golf life, as did any of the great men of the past. He reeled off pars and birdies and got a card of 75, despite a six at home hole, where he slashed his drive into a puddle of water. In the afternoon he won the stroke competition with a return of 77. His driving and wooden play through the fairways was hard and accurate, and he reached all but two of the long holes with his second shot, which proves that the stolid old gutta will get there if you hit hard enough.

GOOD HIGHWAYS REDUCE UPKEEP ON AUTOMOBILE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Some of the most important ways in which highways have a demonstrable earning capacity, Secretary Wallace of Agriculture declares, are the potential savings in cost of operation, maintenance, and depreciation of motor vehicles.

It is estimated the annual fuel bill paid by motor vehicles amounts to \$1,000,000,000, and the annual tire bill \$450,000,000. The annual depreciation may be computed on an estimated investment of \$8,767,500,000 in motor vehicles.

Although these figures are estimates, Secretary Wallace says they are a reasonable indication of the magnitude of the financial side of our motor transport equipment and it is evident that the operating costs will be affected materially by the general improvement of the country's highways.
