DUGAN WINS IN 8TH WITH K. O.

Johnny Copeland was the third man in the ring and his work was well received.

OHIO COLLEGE STRIKES HAPPY STUDY MEDIUM

BOSTON, Nov. 30.—In an address today before the Twentieth Century Club Arthur E. Morgan, president of Antioch College, Yellow Springs, Ohio, outlined the work of this institution in giving young men and young women a well proportioned training for modern life. He clarified the possibility of educating youth successfully both culturally and professionally, and at the same time spoke in part as follows:

"Of 1,500,000 Americans filling administrative positions, only one in 5 or 10 is a college graduate. But the other 80 or 90 per cent are not uneducated. Charles M. Schwab recently remarked to a university graduating class: 'The education men get in the workshops of this country is just as much education as the education you men and women have received here.'"

"The professional educator tends to ignore any but his own field. Liberal colleges center the student's attention upon cultural subjects, commonly leaving him ignorant of practical life and of any vocation. Technical schools train technicians, who too often graduate ignorant both of the world of educated men and the world of practical experience. The self-made man frequently feels that the school of hard knocks after all is best.

"There is no reason, except habit and tradition for the separation of these elements of education. They all are necessary, and all can be united in a single program. Such a program is in operation at Antioch College. Here class room time is divided about equally between cultural courses, aimed to develop liberally trained men and women, and technical or professional courses. In addition the students spend part time in economic work.

Half the students work while the other half study. At the end of each five-week period those at col-

lege go to work, and those at work return to college. Each job is filled by two students alternating. A hundred and twenty firms cooperate with Antioch in furnishing part time employment, the primary aim of which is to acquaint students with real life, to develop initiative, responsibility, self-reliance, and perseverance. Also it helps them to discover suitable callings and to prepare for them. Incidentally this plan more than cuts in two the cost of college education, without the strain commonly accompanying self-support.

"The technical courses, whether in engineering, journalism, business administration, or other callings for men and women, aim to train for all round administration, rather than for specialized technique.

"Students are carefully selected from all parts of the country. Only serious and intelligent boys and girls can keep the pace; if others gain admission, they soon drop out. The alternation of work and study finds students keen for both. Dr. Charles W. Elliot recently called Antioch 'the most interesting and important educational experiment in America.'"

GERMAN CULTURE IS THREATENED BY SOAP PRICES

BERLIN, Nov. 30.—German culture is seriously threatened by the high price of soap. An ordinary cake of toilet soap cost 30,000,000 marks October 1, which was about 16 American cents estimated on the rate of exchange for that day. Laundry soap is proportionately high, and the press is filled with complaints that the average family cannot maintain a home under such prices. Starch and other laundry supplies are also soaring.

The buildings can only be heated spasmodically because of the scarcity of coal and many of the private bath parlors have also shut down. Few apartment houses have any hot water, as central heating has been generally abandoned and the price of coal has risen to a luxury in the average home.

A \$2,000,000 plant, the first of its kind in the United States, is being constructed near Buffalo for the manufacture of cellophane, a transparent cellulose product, used very largely in millinery for decoration and in the soap, confectionery and other trades for wrapping purposes.

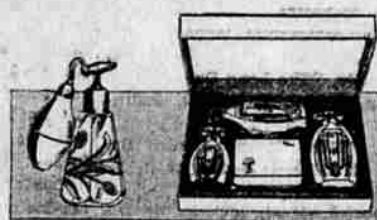
