

FELIX MURDER IS LAID TO UNKNOWN PERSONS BY JURY

Inquest Fails to Place Blame For Death of Mexican Killed Near Algoma

The death of Jose R. Felix whose body was found in Klamath lake, near Rattlesnake point Tuesday night, was due to a crushing injury inflicted on the skull by some person or persons unknown, according to a verdict of a coroner's jury late yesterday afternoon, following an inquest held at 4:30 P. M.

The verdict reads: "Jose R. Felix came to death in this county at or near Algoma, Klamath county, at a point known as Rattlesnake Point; that he came to his death by means of a crushing injury to the skull; and that he was struck and killed by a party or some parties unknown, including the crime of cold-blooded murder having been committed."

The coroner's jury consisted of Louis C. Weather, B. S. Grigsby, Frank Dugman, S. T. Summers, Marion Banks and J. Posposil. Witnesses at the inquest were J. H. Howell, N. L. Towey, Dr. L. L. Truax, G. B. Cozad, and L. L. Low.

No arrests in connection with the murder had been made at a late hour this afternoon.

FIREMAN INJURED IN GRANTS PASS WRECK RECOVERING

J. H. Kendall Sustained Broken Wrist And Crushed Foot as Freight Train Is Derailed

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Dec. 6.—J. H. Kendall, locomotive fireman, who was injured when a Southern Pacific freight train was derailed near here Tuesday will recover. Kendall was pinned beneath the cab. His wrist was broken and foot crushed. One toe was amputated.

Main line traffic was tied up for six or eight hours by the wreck. A broken flange is supposed to have caused the accident. Two locomotives and two cars were turned over.

GIRL QUIZZED IN FRAUD CASE

Miss Dorothy Anderson Denies Knowledge of Insurance Hoax

NAPA, Calif., Dec. 6.—Miss Dorothy Anderson, companion of Edward J. Salstad, confessed perpetrator of an insurance hoax at Lake Nebajohn, Wisconsin, in which he disappeared and burned the body of a friend to make it appear his own, was questioned today by District Attorney Anglin at the hospital where she is confined with incipient tuberculosis. Anglin also intended to question Salstad further to clear up phases of the case not fully revealed in his confession.

Salstad, three years ago, rented a summer cottage at the lake, disinterred a body from the cemetery and set the cottage afire, disappearing with Miss Anderson, his stenographer. His wife is suing the insurance company and has married again in Wisconsin.

Miss Anderson, in a preliminary statement, said she met Salstad in Chicago in 1919, that she liked him very much but did not love him. She was engaged to another man, but Salstad induced her to break the engagement and come to Eau Claire, Wis., as his stenographer at the Multiphone Phonograph company, of which he is president.

Mrs. Salstad complained she was causing trouble in the family and urged her to quit her husband's employ. The girl said she went back to Chicago and Salstad followed her. Later they left for San Antonio, Texas, where they went into business. A storm damaged their place and they took an automobile and toured California, playing they were gypsies. She insisted she knew nothing of Salstad's wrongdoing.

SWEDISH PRINCE WRITES PLAY

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 6.—Prince William of Sweden, second son of King Gustaf V, who has made a reputation as a big game hunter, a poet, and a dramatic critic, is now also a full-fledged dramatist, his first play having been accepted for production by the Swedish theater in Stockholm.

Prince William's play is entitled "Kinaakozil," the word being of African origin and signifying "guide." The scenes are laid in Africa.

MAN WHO REMOVED SIGNAL LIGHTS IS HELD UNBALANCED

Robert Kresing, Arrested by S. P. Watchman, Forgets Name in Justice Court

Robert Kresing was arrested Tuesday night by Charles Dugan, watchman employed by the Southern Pacific, for the alleged offense of removing the signal lights at the station. According to Justice Emmitt, Kresing is a man of unbalanced mind and instead of sentencing him for the offense committed him to jail and turned the matter over to County Judge Bunnell. When asked his name by Justice Emmitt, Kresing could not remember it.

GERMANY OVERCOMING DISEASE

BERLIN, Dec. 6.—Typhus and trachoma, diseases of filth and poverty, gradually are being brought under control in Germany. Diphtheria and scarlet fever also show decreases. Practically all contagious diseases are disappearing in proportion to the time elapsed since the war.

ing independence and of peaceful settlement of international controversies. He called attention that the United States acting on these principles had for nearly 25 years been a member of The Hague tribunal and added that the proposed world court was "a new and somewhat different plan."

Not Partisan Question. "This is not a partisan question," he added. "It should not assume an artificial importance. As I wish to see a court established, and as the proposal presents the only practical plan on which many nations have agreed, though it may not meet every desire, I therefore commend it to the favorable consideration of the senate, with the proposed reservations clearly indicating our refusal to adhere to the League of Nations."

The endorsement of the Mellon plan was presented in the course of a discussion of the fiscal condition the president called to attention that through the budget system and economy in expenditures the necessities of the government, exclusive of the postoffice department, had been brought down to \$3,000,000,000. Large Reduction Possible. "It is possible, in consequence, to

make a large reduction in the taxes of the people," he continued. "A proposed plan has been presented in detail in a statement by the secretary of the treasury which has my unqualified approval. . . . A very great service could be rendered through immediate enactment of legislation relieving the people of some of the burden of taxation. Of all services which the congress can render to the country, I have no hesitation in declaring this one to be paramount."

The president prefaced his message with a tribute to President Harding, declaring "the world knew his kindness and his humanity, his greatness and his character, and that he has made justice more certain and peace more secure."

"He is gone," Mr. Coolidge said. "We remain. It is our duty under the inspiration of his example to take up the burdens which he was permitted to lay down and to develop and support the wise principles of government which he represented."

From this basis the president then launched upon his recommendations which, in addition to those relative to taxation, world court, transportation and soldier legislation included:

Government operation of the war-built merchant marine until shipping conditions are such as to allow it to be disposed of advantageously.

Strengthening of the coast guard to combat rum smuggling; rigid regulation of the major source of liquor production; suppression of interstate traffic in liquor and promotion of respect for law.

Restrictive Immigration.

Continuation of the policy of restrictive immigration, with immigrants to be selected abroad, and the immediate registration of all aliens.

Strengthening rather than weakening of the army and navy with additional airplanes for the army; more submarines for the navy, and increased defenses for the Panama canal.

Action under private ownership of coal mines that will obtain greater continuity of production and greater public protection against "unbearably high" prices along the lines of the recommendations laid down by the federal coal commission.

Relief for the farmer through

lower taxes and freight rates; cheaper fertilizers; greater organization which would permit reduction of the wheat acreage; diversification of farming; encouragement in the formation of co-operative marketing organizations; continuation of government loans, and assistance in exportation through the war finance corporation.

Sale of Muscle Shoals.

Sale of Muscle Shoals together with a location for an auxiliary steam plant and rights-of-way for a power line so that the agriculture of the nation may get greater and lower cost of fertilizer, with the sale price of the properties not a major consideration.

Anti-lynching legislation; additional appropriations for vocational training in agriculture for negroes, and creation of a commission of whites and negroes "to formulate a better policy for mutual understanding and confidence."

Extension of the civil service to the prohibition enforcement field forces exclusive of the members of the present force and placing in the classified civil service of postmasters of the first, second and third classes.

Opening of intra-coastal waterways; control of the flood water of the Mississippi and Colorado rivers; construction of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence waterway and power project; and promotion of the superpower development of the north-eastern states.

Creation of a commission of judges and lawyers to simplify federal court procedure.

Child Labor Limitations. Limitation on child labor through constitutional amendment.

Regulation of radio interference and aviation.

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Promotion of highway construction and reforestation.

Relief to occupants of reclamation projects by empowering the secretary of the interior to suspend, readjust and reassess all the charges against water users.

In addition to these and a score more of recommendations, relatively of less importance, Mr. Coolidge discussed foreign debts, declaring himself against cancellation and for a reasonable adjustment in accordance with the principle adopted for the British debt, and announced he would oppose recognition of Russia so long as the ruling regime refuses to recognize the right of private property ownership and the debt contracted by Russia after the overthrow of the czar.



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
