

CUT COSTS OF MEN'S TOGS AIM

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 6.—Reduction in the cost of men's clothing and furnishings by reducing the cost of production is the announced purpose of an organized effort which has been started by the National Association of Retail Clothiers. This is planned to be accomplished by the formation of a clothing industry commission consisting of a representative from each of the allied industries in the clothing trade.

The lowering process in cost is expected to be done without cutting into legitimate profits, according to Sol Schloss of Indianapolis, the new president of the association.

"We are going to begin at the fountain head, that is, the original cost, and everyone in the clothing business is going to be given an opportunity to aid in the movement," he said.

"We have sent out from our Chicago headquarters a request that all the various organizations in the clothing industry appoint committees to study out the best methods of eliminating unnecessary expenses. This appeal has been sent to the clothing manufacturers, woolen and worsted manufacturers, spinners, manufacturers of hats, knitted goods and work clothing. When these committees have made a complete survey of their various lines and decided where the slack can be taken up, the chairman of each committee will go to Chicago and the clothing industry commission will be formed. When this commission gets together all the results, each allied industry will be amalgamated and in this way we should be able to reduce to a considerable extent the actual cost of distribution, which will enable the retailer to give better values."

MARINES LAND IN CHINA PORT

HONGKONG, Dec. 7.—Marines from a foreign warship anchored off Shamen the foreign settlement of Canton landed on the bund and took possession of the customs house, fortifying themselves with machine guns, according to advices here. Six foreign gunboats are off Shamen, including two American vessels.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—A news dispatch from Hongkong today says the action of the powers in sending marines ashore at Canton was for the purpose of preventing Sun-Yat-Sen from seizing the custom-house as he threatened. When visited by the British commander-in-chief and the French admiral Sun-Yat-Sen is quoted as promising non-interference "if the measures you take are sufficient to prevent me."

QUAKE EXPERTS SEEK BREAK ON EARTH'S CRUST

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—An exhaustive study of earthquakes in and near the American continent is being made by the weather bureau in co-operation with the coast and geodetic survey, the Canadian meteorological officials, a number of universities and about 5000 volunteer observers. Among the university records which are proving of great value are those kept by Father Tondorf, in charge of the seismological laboratory at Georgetown university, whose announcement that a violent earthquake had been registered by his instruments was the first news given the world of the Japanese disaster.

William J. Humphreys, professor of meteorological physics, has charge of the weather bureau's work. The purpose of the study, he said, primarily is to determine the exact lo-

cations of breaks and cracks in the earth's crust and to gain knowledge of the substructure of the land, although it is hoped eventually to develop a method by which earthquakes may be forecast and their danger minimized.

Only a persistent study, in the opinion of Father Tondorf, can lead to a scientific basis of forecasting earthquakes.

"The geography of earthquakes," he said, "is certain and invariable. No earthquake can happen except at lines of weakness in the earth's crust. Evidently these lines of weakness can only give when the stresses brought to bear on them become sufficiently great. Geological changes, discernible at the surface and within reach of mathematical computation, might presage fairly accurately the release of such stresses. On the basis that these releases of stresses do not happen suddenly but gradually, suitably installed pendula might betray these displacements."

The value of the earthquake data being accumulated by the weather bureau, Professor Humphreys pointed out, is revealed chiefly in its application to large engineering undertakings, particularly water supply systems.

Earthquakes of sufficient intensity to make a clear record upon

seismological instruments, Professor Humphreys explained, are located approximately, if not exactly, by comparing observations at various widely scattered points and studying different types of vibrations resulting from the breaking or slipping of a section of the earth's crust.

Father Tondorf said a theory worked out by Dr. Omori, head of the Imperial Earthquake Investigation committee, who died recently, had a fair test in the recent Japanese catastrophe. Dr. Omori, from data extending over a period of 75 years, noted that when the lesser earthquakes were more frequent, disastrous ones were less likely to happen, and vice-versa. Dr. Omori interpreted these smaller movements of the crust as so many factors in establishing an equilibrium in seismic areas. Having ascertained that the period of these lesser manifestations in Japan is six years, he predicted in 1921 that within six years after 1921 there would occur a destructive quake.
