

BRIDE OF WEEK MEETS DEATH IN CAR PLUNGE

EUGENE, Dec. 7.—Mrs. Josephine Byers, formerly Josephine Good, widow of a well-known local man, was drowned late Wednesday night at Harrisburg ferry landing when a car driven by William J. Parks, of San Francisco, plunged into the river. Her husband, Robert Byers of Los Angeles, had a narrow escape from death.

Byers and his bride were enroute to Los Angeles where they were to live. Mrs. Byers, burdened by a heavy coat, was swept down the stream. He clung to an obstruction in the stream and was saved. Byers and Parks were friends and former service men. They had worked together in Washington the past summer. Parks reported losing a wallet containing \$250. The machine is lying under 16 feet of water.

WOODWORKERS GET AUTONOMY
LONDON, Dec. 7.—In view of the difficulties of preserving continuity between the parent organization and branches in the United States and Canada, the Amalgamated Society of Woodworkers of Great Britain has decided to give their American membership complete local autonomy and control over their own affairs. It is stated that management expenses in the United States and Canada have grown to an average annual charge of more than 25 shillings per member.

RAPID-FIRE PAINTING IS THE THING NOWADAYS, SAYS FAMOUS ARTISTS' MODEL

BERKELEY, Dec. 7.—(Special.)—The "World's Most Famous Artists' Model" has been posing on the campus of the University of California. He is Signor Antonio Corai, and is known as the man of mystery and the man with a million moods.

"I believe that art is one of the most beautiful things in the world; if we did not have art we would have nothing," said the signor.

He believes that a great revolution in painting, sculpturing and drawing is on. This change occurs principally in technique. Forty years ago it would require months to make a portrait. Now it is possible to produce one at only one sitting, a matter of a few hours. Long and dashing strokes supplant the short and "plexy" ones of old.

"An inspiration is a thing of the moment," burst forth Corai, and his fiery eyes twinkled. You must express it in a moment or it is lost," he continued. "This may be accomplished by the new stroke."

Antonio Corai is a man who knows the past and sees the future. He believes that futuristic art is a part of the revolution. "It is deep and puzzling. I cannot understand all of it myself."

HAPPINESS UNKNOWN TO MILLIONS IN U. S. DECLARES SPEAKER

CLEVELAND, Dec. 7.—"There are more than 30,000,000 human beings living under the American flag who have not had a fair chance for life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness," said Dr. John A. Marshall, of New York, general secretary of the Presbyterian board of national missions, addressing the Presbyterian conference. "America does not mean to those people what it means to you and me. To us it means a land of freedom, of good schools, fine churches, efficient hospitals. To them, our brethren, it means a land of hardship and struggle, of exploitation and defeated aspirations."

"How fast can America ascend the scale of progress? Only as fast as the most backward and neglected elements in our population. The Presbyterian board of national missions is sending its missionaries among these unfortunate to help them with a ministry of health, education and evangelism. The Presbyterian church is establishing Sunday schools and churches, day schools and hospitals, neighborhood houses and community stations. There is no self-interest in this work. It is a service of Christ and for America. Every good citizen ought to have a part in this work, not only because it is well intended, but also because it is actually accomplishing results. These missionaries are bringing the spirit of God to move upon the chaos of their communities, bringing light out of their darkness, order out of their disorder, growth out of their stagnation and beauty out of their ugliness."

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7.—The sheriff's office here today received telegraphic instructions from Pendleton to hold Eliza Pittman, arrested yesterday at an auto camp, and to forward photographs of the woman taken with him who asserts she is his wife. A warrant was issued last June for Pittman, in connection with the supposed slaying of his wife Edna. A body identified by her parents as that of their daughter was found floating in the Columbia river. The woman with Pittman here said she was the person thought to have been slain.

LOSS IN MILL FIRE IS HUGE

BEALINGHAM, Wash., Dec. 7.—Swept by a strong southerly gale, fire yesterday destroyed five dry kilns, planing mill and lumber yard of Morrison Brothers sawmill at Anacortes. The flames threatened the main sawmill. The loss is estimated at between \$250,000 and \$400,000.

BUFFALO BILL'S RANCH INVOLVED IN SUIT OVER LEASE

NORTH PLATTE, Neb., Dec. 7.—Scout's Rest ranch, for many years a show place of the west while owned by William F. ("Buffalo Bill") Cody, now is a run-down and ordinary piece of property where a few cattle still graze, but buffalo are no more and where social gatherings are of another day.

The ranch, located about two miles west of North Platte, now is known as "Cody's ranch." It passed from the ownership of the famous scout and buffalo hunter several years before his death in 1917.

Its 20,000 or more acres of land has dwindled to 1,200.

The land that remains as a part of the famous ranch and rendezvous for visiting nobility, celebrated statesmen and army officers, now is owned by a company and leased to a tenant. Trouble has arisen over the lease and the property now is the subject of litigation.

Cody came to this part of the country following the Civil war. His job was to furnish laborers engaged in constructing the Union Pacific lines west, with meat. The meat provided was that from the buffalo, which were more numerous then. Deer and jackrabbits are at present. During an 18 month's period, in 1867 and 1868, Cody personally killed about 4300 buffalo for the Union Pacific laborers. It was at this time that he was given the name of "Buffalo Bill."

Local acquaintances recall "Buffalo Bill's" first wild west show. It was the occasion of a local celebration at which Cody was asked to provide one of the entertainment features. He hit upon the wild west idea, and spent much time in rehearsing his act. The show was such

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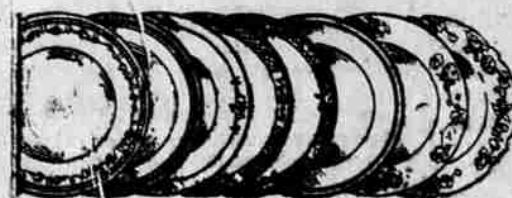
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
