

COOLIDGE TO MAKE ADDRESS BY RADIO 10TH

Plans for Harding Memorial
to be Broadcast by
President

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 8.—For the first time a White House message will go out to the country by radio on December 10, when President Coolidge will speak on the plans for a memorial to the late President Harding.

This announcement is particularly interesting because it is expected that if Coolidge finds he has a good voice for radio broadcasting he will make a number of addresses to the country on political issues by wireless.

Coolidge is not a ready platform speaker and neither his voice nor his personality is adapted to popular political speaking. Hence, his own personal preference is to remain somewhat secluded during the coming presidential campaign, reaching the country chiefly through radio addresses which would be printed in the newspapers.

The Harding Memorial address will last about 10 minutes and will begin at 8:30 P. M., eastern standard time, Monday, December 10. Special apparatus set up at the White House will carry the president's voice from his study by land wires to broadcasting stations at New York, Providence, Chicago, St. Louis, Dallas and other western cities, where it will be reamplified and distributed by radio. It will be broadcast direct from Washington also.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 8.—All radio transmitting stations in the United States were called upon by Secretary of Commerce Hoover to remain silent from 8:30 to 8:45 Monday night to clear the air for the sending of President Coolidge's address on behalf of the Harding Memorial association.

Hoover's request applies even to stations engaged in commercial business and the navy department has offered to co-operate by suspending all radio operations, including those of the big station at Arlington, Va.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 8.—On land and sea and through the air, tribute to Warren G. Harding, 29th president of the United States, will be paid during Harding Memorial week which begins tomorrow and ends December 16. In every state of the Union, United States territories and island possession, an eight-day period of commemoration will be observed. From the White House, where President Coolidge will speak over the radio Monday evening, in appreciation of his late chief, to remote country schoolhouses where exercises will be held some time during the week, the name of Harrison will be eulogized. Ships of the United States navy and merchant vessels at sea will hold brief memorial ceremonies, according to advice received by the Harding Memorial association here.

In churches, from coast to coast, memorial services will be held tomorrow. Harding was the staunch friend of all creeds and tribute to his practical religion will be widespread.

President Coolidge's memorial message, delivered from the White House study, will be the first radio broadcast by a president. It is expected that through powerful amplifying apparatus, everyone in the land with access to radio equipment will be able to hear his words of appreciation of Warren G. Harding.

During the week social, civic, religious and fraternal organizations of every community will hold meetings in honor of the late president. At the meetings plans of the Harding Memorial association to provide a permanent Harding tomb, preserve the Harding home at Marion as a shrine, and endow a Harding Chair of Diplomacy and Functions of Government in his name, will be explained.

GETS 18 MONTHS FOR ATTEMPT TO KIDNAP BERGDOLL

LOS BACH, Baden, Dec. 8.—A sentence of three years for Corliss Hoover Griffiths of Hamilton, Ohio, was recommended today by state's attorney for the attempt to kidnap Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, American draft evader. The court sentenced Griffiths to 18 months' imprisonment.

The district attorney also urged three years' imprisonment for Earl Sperber of Paris, one year for the Russian Prince Faust Gagarin, and six months for Eugene Victor Nelson, who were implicated in the Bergdoll kidnapping attempt.

Bergdoll's counsel contended these terms were insufficient and asked the court for heavier sentences, especially for Griffiths and Nelson.

ALTITUDE RECORD ATTEMPT FAILURE

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Dec. 8.—Wanda Pope, of Merrill, junior in home economics, has been chosen as one of the 19 delegates to represent college students who want to discuss and help solve the problems confronting the world today. More than 50 O. A. C. students signified their desire to attend the convention. Since this institution's delegation is limited to 19 persons, a committee was appointed to select the ones to go. The committee was composed of a representative each from the faculty, Y. M. C. A., Corvallis churches, and the local student volunteer organization.

O.A.C. at the ninth international student volunteer convention in Indianapolis, December 28 to January 1.

These conventions are held every four years and are international in scope. More than 5000 students, representing more than 1000 colleges and universities, attended the last gathering at Des Moines in 1919,20.
