

FRIENDLY SUIT IS ADVISED TO SETTLE ELECTION QUESTION

Oregon City Councilmen Told to Refuse to Vacate Offices, Forcing Legal Action

OREGON CITY, Ore., Dec. 13.—City Attorney Stone, who yesterday ruled that the city election set December 18, was invalid, today advised the council to take the matter to court after the election on Quo warranta proceedings. He advised the present council to launch a suit after January 2 by refusing to vacate offices, and thus force the new commissioners to seek legal aid in securing control of city affairs.

JAPAN ERECTS ONLY RELIEF STRUCTURES

Money and Material Are Notably Absent For Reconstruction on Grand Plan

TOKIO, Dec. 13.—Officials place the toll of death resulting from Japan's earthquake and fire of September 1 at approximately 150,000. The material losses are estimated at anywhere from 4,000,000,000 to 10,000,000,000 yen. The cost of reconstruction cannot be accurately estimated, as government decision is awaited on plans under consideration.

Meanwhile 4,000,000 yen (about \$20,000,000) has been spent in relief work, and the quakes continue. According to the meteorological bureau there have been 370 quakes since the big one which occurred at exactly 11:58 o'clock on the morning of September 1. Of that number 356 occurred on September 1 and 2. The number continued at a decreasing rate daily thereafter.

No two authorities agree on the extent of the material losses. K. Kodama, president of the Yokohama Specie bank places the "direct losses" of the government and private concerns at 4,000,000,000 yen, while Chokiguro Kadono, chief director of Messrs. Okura & Co., one of the largest concerns in Japan, says the losses will reach 10,000,000,000.
